**TIP 'O THE MORNING:**  
Metropolitan operas will be broadcast by WISC starting Dec. 1. Names of operas to be on the air have not been announced.

Miss Moorehead's mother, Mrs. John H. Moorehead, and friends will come from her former home, Reedsburg, for the performances. Visitors are expected, too, from Soldiers Grove, where the actress formerly taught.

The Guild will start its new season with "Two Blind Mice," a satire on bureaucracy. Performances will be at 8:15 p.m. today and Friday in West high school auditorium and at 8:15 p.m. Saturday in East high school auditorium.

**Mary Riley, 37, and Lota Denham, 57, two Chicago women who are charged with shoplifting three fur pieces from Simpson's, 23 N. Pinckney st., waived preliminary hearing Wednesday and were scheduled for trial without jury Nov. 14 in superior court.**

Two of the three fur pieces, which the women had when they were arrested Aug. 30, were ordered by Superior Judge Roy H. Dist. Atty. Richard W. Bardwell said a store owner and clerks from Muskegon, Mich., who thought they recognized Mrs. Riley and Mrs. Denham from pictures sent out by the Wisconsin state crime laboratory, were unable to identify them Wednesday as shoplifters who took furs last month in Muskegon.

The furs which Proctor ordered returned to Simpson's were a mink stole, valuable jacket at \$425, and a broadtail jacket with a wholesale value of \$170.

The other fur piece which the women are charged with shoplifting and which has not been recovered, is a mink coat with a wholesale value of \$585.

**Truax Soldier Held for Investigation in Assault of Woman**

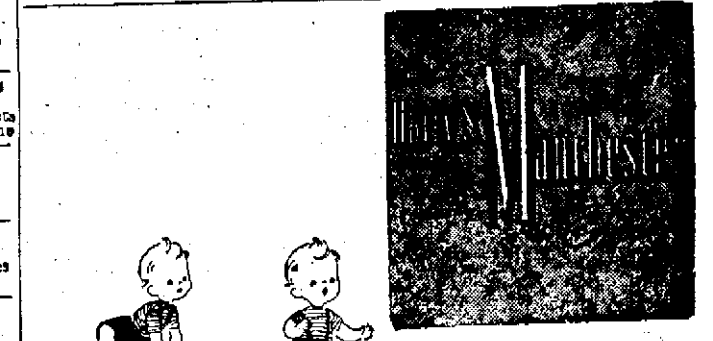
A 29-year-old Truax soldier was held in the city jail Wednesday night for investigation for assaulting a 21-year-old Madison woman in the backyard at her home.
