TV Station Executives Endorse Code of Ethics

CHICAGO. (AP) A proposed code of ethics designed to eliminate obscenity, horror dramas, too much sex and other abuses in television programming has been endorsed by television executives.

Eighty members of the National Association of Radio and Television Broadcasters approved the code "in principle." A spokesman said the code was drafted as an answer to a bill before Congress which calls for a national advisory board to act as a "watchdog" over abuses in television.

The code also places curbs on excesses in TV advertising. It covers such subjects as "responsibility to children" and "decency and decorum in production."

Drafting of a final code was to be taken at a meeting of the group's television board in Washington the week of Dec. 2. The board is made up of nine station and two network representatives.

Robert D. Swezey of New Orleans, chairman of a committee which drafted the code, said: "We intend that television's influence shall be for the good of the people who comprise the viewing audience."

The association's members approved a plan to set up a television review board of six to police all programs. The code would establish a "seal of approval," which member TV stations could display on their screens.

The code recognizes a responsibility of the industry for "advancement of culture and education" and noted TV broadcasters should seek counsel of educational institutions for enlightenment on serving community needs in that field.

A section of "acceptability of program material," which cited specific objectionable words and visual situations was shifted from the body of the code by the broadcasters and designed as a working appendix. A long list of specific words and terms prohibited on radio as obscene and vulgar is included. Attacks on religion and creeds are banned.

Political telecasts would be identified as such. While not forbidden sponsored religious broadcasts, the code would discourage accepting pay for them.
