OPS Agents Find 355 Violators in 3 State

CHICAGO—(UP)—The regional Office of Price Stabilization (OPS) said Tuesday that its investigators had found 355 separate violations of OPS regulations in visits to 301 slaughterhouses and wholesale meat establishments in the Illinois-Indiana-Wisconsin region between Sept. 25 and Oct. 23.
The OPS said that 122 violators

had been found, and 13 injunction proceedings begun, but no criminal actions were filed.

Utah Indians Await First Checks in Land Suit Claim

FT. DUCHESNE, Utah -(U.P)-There was joy Tuesday night in the scattered huts and hogans of the 1,000,000 acre Unitah-Ouray Indian reservation in eastern Utah. The 1679 members of the Unitah, White River, and Uncompangre tribes of the Ute band of Indians today start collecting from the \$31,938,673 land claim suit they recently won from the United

States government. The settlement, largest Uncle Sam has ever made on his Redskin charges, is in payment for lands— now rich in agriculture, forests, oil and shale—in eastern Colo-rado that Whites took in an 1880

The multi-million-dollar payment will be dished out carefully to the Utes, whose average family income

has been \$800 a year, Congressionally approved regulations provide that only one third of it goes to the Indians during the next three years. What happens after that depends on how wisely

the money is used.

About \$15,000,000 eventually will go to Utes still living in southern Colorado — the 900 members of the Ignacio, Ute Mountain and Towoac tribes around Durango. They haven't figured out yet how


and when they want it.

But the Utah-dwelling Utes, with two college-educated tribesmen as planning chairmen, have made their preparations carefully. Out of the original third of their


