Because of the illness of Beatrice Bentz Hagen, violist, the Pro Arte quartet has changed its program for the first of a series of six concerts planned for the 1951-52 season.

In the concert at 8 p. m. Sunday in Music hall, Verne Reynolds will join the quartet in Mozart's "Horn Quintet in E-Flat Major, K. 407," which will replace the string quintet originally scheduled.

Reynolds, an instructor in the University of Wisconsin school of music, is a former member of the Cincinnati Symphony orchestra.

Five of the six programs will be repeated in Milwaukee. Dates for that city are Nov. 6, Dec. 4, Jan. 15, Mar. 4, and Apr. 8.

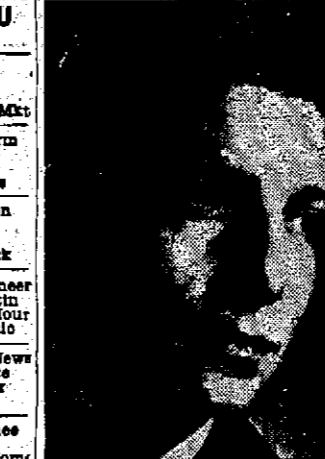
The witnesses were cashier C. H. Sealy of the Iron Exchange bank at Hurley, Wis., assistant cashier H. F. Davis, and Walter Mazurka, operator of Skippy's Place, a restaurant near Lac du Flambeau.

The grand jury is investigating charges that Capone, brother of the late gangster Al Capone, made false statements in trying to settle a \$90,000 back income tax bill.

The Iron Exchange bank handled the accounts of the Rex Hotel which Capone formerly owned near Hurley.

Dog 'Bill of Rights' Defeated in Nebraska

ALLIANCE, Neb. (AP)—The town's dogs lost out in a special election held here Monday night as voters turned down a proposed "canine bill of rights."

Only about half of the town's 1,700 registered voters turned out for the special election, called to decide whether a new dog law should be adopted to give the pets a break.

The final vote was 571 against the law, 354 for it. The election followed a spirited campaign which city officials said got a little out of hand. Even the supporters of the proposed liberalized dog called the vote "the most ridiculous, asinine and childish election ever held in any community in the United States."

The "Dog Welfare Association" claimed the ordinance would have provided a "way of life" for dogs and dog owners and a "humane death" for bad dogs. It campaigned under the slogan "quit kicking my dog around."

An 18-year-old Lodi youth was in Milwaukee Tuesday afternoon "sweating out" the results of a pre-induction examination, which, if passed, would allow him to join his three brothers in Uncle Sam's air force.

Robert R. Clark, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lester Clark, Lodi, took the examination Tuesday after applying at the Madison army and air force recruiting station for enlistment in the air force.

He told Madison recruiters he wanted to join his brothers, Pvt. Reuben A. Clark, 20, Pvt. Duane Clark, 17, and Sgt. William E. Meister, 23, in the air force.

The four are adopted sons of Mr. and Mrs. Clark.

Duane enlisted several days ago and now is at Lackland air force base, San Antonio, Tex. Reuben enlisted last January and now is with an airborne division at Ft. Bragg, N. C. Sgt. Meister has been an air force man for nearly six years, having enlisted in January, 1945. He is stationed at the Sampson, N. Y. air force base.

Two other youths enlisted in the army at the Madison recruiting station Tuesday. They are Lowell F. Hodgson, 1221 Rutledge st., and Kenneth R. Williams, Milwaukee, a University of Wisconsin student.
