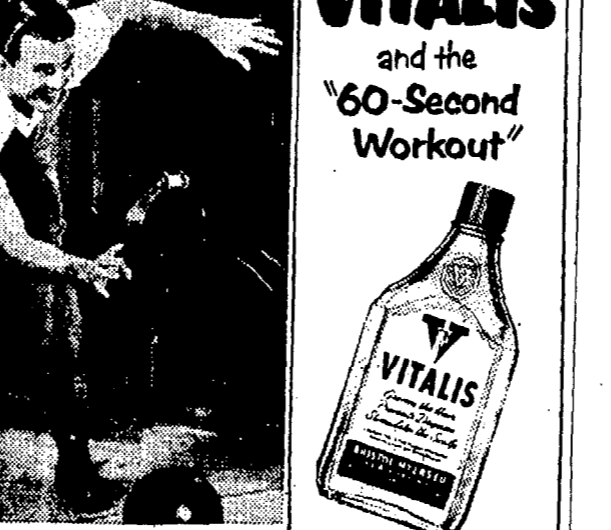

Freak Accident Near Camp Douglas Injures 3

MAUSTON — Three persons were injured and six cars damaged in a freak accident near Camp Douglas on Highways 12 and 16 Wednesday afternoon. Injured were Anton S. Bernard, 51, Brookfield, Ill., treated in the hospital here for a broken arm; Herman J. Roberts, 40, Highland Park, Ill., a cut leg; and James A. Kern, Chippewa Falls, a sprained left knee. A high north wind blowing smoke from a grass fire across the road caused the first car in the string to stop when visibility dropped to zero. In the following series of rear-end collisions, all six cars were damaged, causing damage estimated at more than \$1,600. None of the other three drivers were injured.
