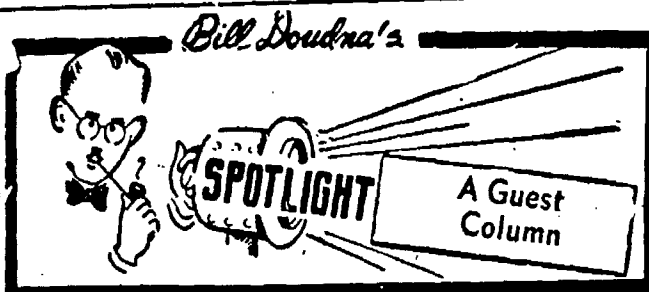

(The Taliesin Fellowship will present a demonstration of the work of Georges Gurdjieff, directed by Iovanna Lloyd Wright, in the Unitarian meeting house, 800 University Bay dr., at 8 p. m. Tuesday. This guest column was written by the noted Wisconsin architect who conducts the Taliesin school.)

This occasion is for us at Taliesin a particular celebration. In Paris two years ago the philosopher, Georges Gurdjieff, died. He, one day, will be of great value to our West if with persistent intelligence we strive to understand his work. On this occasion we are proud to contribute our own demonstration of the innate rhythms correlating mind and body which he designed. At about this same time other groups, larger than ours, are honoring him likewise in Paris, London and New York.

When "Gorgevanitch" first came here 18 years ago, he saw the connection between his work and mine. For Gurdjieff was a Builder. He believed in the building of human character as we believe in the kind of building we call Organic Architecture.

He, too, believed that creation grows only from a true individual, not from scattered frustrated personalities however played upon by education or accidental circumstances. Here, then, we have a philosopher who believes that only by his own work upon himself can any man become an individual in his own right really capable of creating anything at all. That is why the training-methods of Gorgevanitch fit so well into our work here at Taliesin.

He adventured, found access to the sacred temples of the East—those secret places treasured by countries in around and above India. Finally he penetrated Tibet itself.

Rudyard Kipling has said one thing to remember when, speaking of the Orient, he said of East and West, "this twin shall never meet". But here in the work of this remarkable man we believe we have for the first time a philosopher distinguished from all others: a man searching the Orient patiently, sacrificing much during his life-time to make the ancient wisdom of the East not only intelligible to the thought of the West but to make it a way of WORK. At last he gives to us methods for the working out of this deeper wisdom into our own way of life, each for himself.

Gorgevanitch was not only an original philosopher; he was a great artist. Since I met him 18 years ago I often hear his music in my home. Let me tell you there is nothing of the usual or sensual in any of it. It is from another world: a world our Western science does not yet know—the deep inner world of the human spirit. Something of this work of his my daughter and the Taliesin Fellowship present to you on this occasion at the Unitarian church.

You may there see the innate sense of rhythm really in the realm of the human spirit made manifest in abstract patterns of movement which Gorgevanitch has designed for human performance. We are glad to have an opportunity to present to you this evidence of our own trust in the wisdom of his great artistry and we hope as many of you as may will see this demonstration for yourselves.

Aerial Photos OK'd to Decide Future of Highway 12

Wisconsin's highway planners are taking to the air to help them decide what changes should be made in the course of Highway 12 between the Illinois state line and Wisconsin Dells.

The aerial work, first long-distance survey in the state, will be made by the Abrams Aerial Survey Corp., Lansing, Mich., and will start in a few days. It will be finished in about a month, with two planes based at Madison doing the work.

The firm's \$11,831 contract, approved by Gov. Walter Kohler Friday, calls for aerial photos of 570 square miles in the Highway 12 area and also of 14 square miles along Highways 30 and 16 in two townships in Waushara county.

E. L. Roetiger, highway commission engineer, said the surveys are part of a long-range plan to decide whether sections of the road should be relocated in future improvement projects.

The planes will film a strip 140 miles long and 2 to 6 miles wide along Highway 12, which runs some 150 miles from Genoa City on the state line through Madison to Wisconsin Dells on the Wisconsin river.

Kohler also signed a \$24,061 contract for a new bridge over Underwood Creek on a relocated portion of Highway 127 in Iowa county, and a \$5,310 contract to repair the surfacing of some roads in the town of Middleton, Dane county, which were damaged by trucks hauling materials for the South Madison belt line.

Truman Pocket Vetoes Racial Segregation Bill

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Pres. Truman Friday killed by "pocket veto" legislation which he said would require racial segregation in the schools on military bases and other federal property in 17 states. The White House made public a memorandum by the president saying he would not approve the bill. A bill passed by congress dies if the president does not sign it within 10 business days after congress adjourns.

A-Test's Radioactivity Shows Up in Chicago CHICAGO — (UP) — Illinois Institute of Technology scientists reported Friday night that radioactivity in Chicago dustfall "has suddenly increased hundreds of times as a result of the Nevada atom bomb tests." Dr. Walter C. McCrone, senior chemist, said, however, that the radioactivity is still "so far below the tolerance level for human safety that no one need have fears of ill effects." McCrone said the present "dosage" in the air here is much less than one receives when getting a tooth X-rayed. He added that dustfall tests were made before Thursday's big explosion at Las Vegas and that there may be further increases in the amount of radioactivity.

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
