After 5-Day Mercy Flight, Pin in Baby's Lung Is Removed

CHICAGO —(UP)— Doctors removed a pin from the left lung of an 11-month-old Filipino girl in 59 seconds Tuesday after she was brought here on a five-day, 8,000-mile mercy flight from Manila. The operation was performed on tiny Elivra Difuntorum at St. Luke's hospital, four hours after she arrived from San Francisco. Dr. Paul Holinger said the chub by tot was in surgery less than an

hour and the pin was removed in 59 seconds. He and other surgeons sent a tube down the girl's throat and extracted the pin with a tiny forceps.

Holinger said a second pin the girl swallowed had passed into the intestines and would not cause

complications. The baby was reported in "excellent condition" and resting well after the operation, but doctors said they could not determine as yet when she will be ready for disperser.

The dark-eyed little girl was accompanied here by a personal nurse, Manuela Batista, and Dr. Jose Reyes, director of a Manila

nospital.
Originally the child swallowed nine pins but seven were eliminated naturally. Manila hospitals lacked equipment for removal of the one lodged in the lung, and similar equipment was lacking when the child reached San Fran-

cisco.

The trip was sponsored by the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce as a goodwill gesture.

The child's mother, Petral Difuntorum, was unable to accompany her daughter because of ill health. The father is a \$2-a-day clerk in Manila.




