The Trying Age for Radios

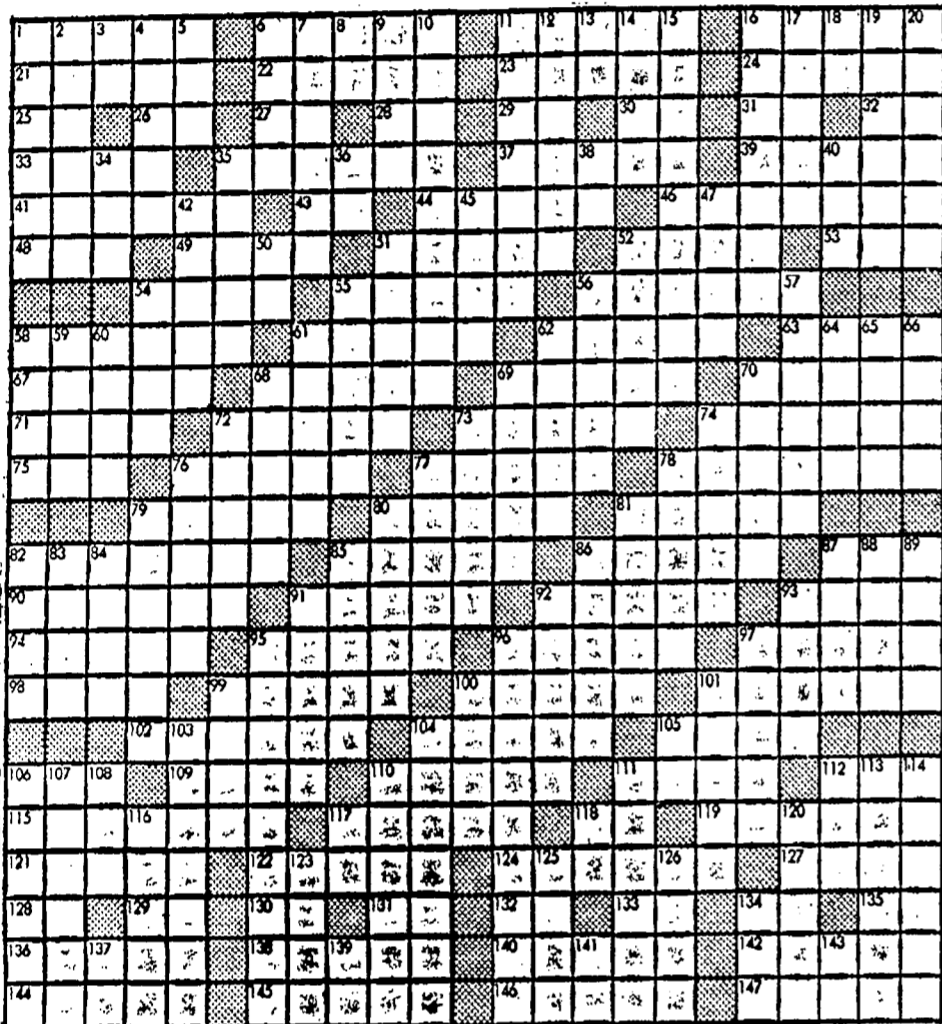

Uncle Ray's Corner

An Art Gallery In a Cave

In eastern France, not far from the border of Italy, is one of the oldest picture galleries in the world. The pictures were made by Stone Age artists, and they decorated the walls of a cave.
The cave is known as Font-de-Gaume. It was formed by underground water, which carved it out of limestone rock.
We do not know just how long ago people began to live in the Font-de-Gaume, but it is believed that some of the pictures on the cave walls date back from 30,000 to 50,000 years.

Many of the pictures are simple outlines. Others are paintings in one or more colors.
There are engravings in fairly large number. These were made by artists who used sharp pieces of flint or other stones to cut into the cave walls. In some cases, the artist made engravings and then went over them with paint.
Entering the cave, a visitor walks about 150 feet before he passes a narrow place called "the Rubicon." Beyond that point is the part known as "the Grand Gallery."
