JACOBY ON BRIDGE

The bidding is a little peculiar in today's hand, but it's very hard to criticize it.

All four players at the table have won several national championships, and if you'd like to tell them what palookas they are, you can find them at this year's nationals in Detroit during the first week of December.

As for myself, I would hardly call any of the players a palooka, but I would observe that North and South wobbled a bit as they reached the contract of three diamonds.

What's more, West managed to foible the defense. West opened the ace of spades, about as good a choice as any, considering the nature of his hand.

Declarer led a club, West played low, and dummy won with the king. Declarer next laid down dummy's ace of diamonds and led another diamond from dummy, finessing the ten from his hand.

West saw all this very clearly without looking at the entire hand. The only chance to set the hand was to attack the hearts.

So West led a small heart, which rode around to South's queen. Now South could afford to lay finesse?

OPS Puts Industry in Chaos, Chief of State Canners Says

MILWAUKEE (AP)—The president of the Wisconsin Canners' Assn. said Monday the state canning industry is in a condition bordering on chaos as the result of ceiling price regulations.

"The existence and purpose of these regulations from the Office of Price Stabilization (OPS) are understandable," A. N. Meyer of Frodonia, told the opening session of the association convention here.

"But their application is so complex and impractical that they have resulted in a tremendous amount of confusion."

"The regulations have perplexed some of the best minds in the nation. Many thousands of dollars were spent in our own state in hiring attorneys and auditors to assist us," said Meyer.

He said the delay caused by having to digest the "complex and impractical applications" of the price regulations cost the canning industry "hundreds of thousands of dollars."

"The item of peas has suffered the most, having lost from 15 to 20 per cent of its movement as compared with a comparable figure last year," Meyer stated.
