Ayers and 'Requiem'

TIP OF THE MORNING: Robert Merrill will produce opera movies in Italy and France, beginning in April, 1952.

DESPITE THE QUOTED statement of Producer Lemuel Ayers that William Faulkner's "Requiem" will open at the Wisconsin Union theater in January, there is nothing definite about it.

In fact, Ayers has not even checked with the theater to find whether the campus playhouse will be available, Mrs. Fanny Taylor, its manager, said Thursday.

Ayers has been quoted as saying that "We have decided definitely on Madison" for the dramatization of "Requiem for a Nun."

If (and it's a mighty big "if") "Requiem" opens here, it will be the third such opening in the Union theater. The first was the Lunt-Fontanne "The Pirate" and the second was the Lunt-Fontanne "I Know My Love."

BALLET: Alicia Alonso, whose pure classical style of ballet dancing has made her one of the outstanding dancers of the present day, will headline the Ballet Theater productions Dec. 17 and 18 in the Wisconsin Union theater.

Miss Alonso, Cuban by birth, was trained in Havana and the United States. She became a member of the Ballet Theater at its inception and has been with the American ballet group ever since, except for occasional appearances elsewhere.

Miss Alonso, Igor Youskevitch, John Kriza, and Mary Ellen Moylan are the premiere dancers with Ballet Theater who will appear in Madison.

Mail orders for the Monday and Tuesday night programs are now being received at the Union theater boxoffice.

NEWS ON THE AIR: A Wisconsin manufacturer just signed a contract for the largest schedule of news broadcasts ever sponsored by a single advertiser. It will consist of 24 news-casts a week on the Mutual network, starting Dec. 31. The contract calls for four five-minute shows a day, six days a week. News-casters will be Les Nichols, H. R. Bankhage, Sam Hayes, and Cecil Brown.
