Defense Chief Answers Critics

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Defense Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson struck back at congressional critics of the mobilization program Friday with the assertion that arms production has tripled in the past year and will double again in 1953.

Mrs. Arnold Schoenberg, widow of the great composer and their daughter, Nuria, will stop in Madison to attend the program. They have been in New York City and are en route to their home in California.

Mrs. Schoenberg is a sister of Rudolf Kolisch, first violinist of the quartet.

Featured work will be Schoenberg's "Transfigured Night," a string sextet in which the Pro Arte men will be joined by Walter Heermann, cellist, and Mrs. Beatrice Hagen, violinist.

MUSIC ON THE AIR: First Metropolitan Opera broadcast of the season is scheduled today on ABC-WISC. It will be "La Traviata," starting at 1 p. m. and starring Licia Albanese, Giacinto Prandelli, and Renato Capecchi.

These stars and Manager Rudolf Bing of the "Met" will speak at the first intermission. At the second intermission, "Opera News on the Air" will be presented by Boris Goldovsky, Eugene Ormandy, and Blanche Thebom. In the weekly "Opera Quiz" will be Robert Lawrence, George Marek, Robert Bagar, Walter Ducloux, and Deeme Taylor.

Beginning tonight, the NBC Symphony orchestra will be heard at a new hour—7 o'clock—on WIBA and WIBA-FM. The conductor will be Guido Cantelli.

State Philosophical Group to Hold 1st Meeting at U.W.

Philosophy professors from colleges throughout the state will convene on the campus of the University of Wisconsin today for the first meeting of the newly organized Wisconsin Philosophical association.

Some 16 philosophers from educational institutions other than the University of Wisconsin are expected to attend. Two talks are scheduled on the morning program and two during the afternoon.

Prof. A. C. Garnett, chairman of the university philosophy department, will welcome the visitors at the opening of the morning session, which will include addresses on "The Natural Slave in Aristotle's Ethics" by Prof. Charles J. O'Neill and "Liberty and Democracy" by Prof. Gerard Smith. Both men are from Marquette university.

Leader of the discussion following Prof. O'Neill's talk will be Prof. William H. Hay of the University of Wisconsin, and Prof. Raymond Ramsden of Oshkosh State college will lead the discussion following Prof. Smith's address. Presiding at the morning session will be Prof. J. R. Williams of Beloit college.

D. M. Datta, visiting professor at the University from the University of Patna, India, will speak during the afternoon on "Is Truth One?" and Prof. C. L. Golightly of Wisconsin will speak on "Mind, Body, Causation, and Correlation."

Discussion leaders will be Prof. Jacob Van Tuinen, Carroll college, and Prof. Richard W. Burnet.

Wilson, who files to Key West today to give Pres. Truman a firsthand report on defense production, promised a repeat of the production "miracles" of World War II.

From now on, he said, Americans will get "guns and less butter, or guns and margarine."

He conceded the arms program is behind schedule on "certain essential items." But he said this is due to design changes and the fact that a big part of the mobilization program thus far has gone into expansion of plants and sources of basic materials, electricity, and oil.

The senate preparedness subcommittee said in a report Thursday that delivery of armaments is lagging "dangerously" because defense production planners are trying to turn out both "guns and butter."

It was in the wake of this charge that the Winter White House at Key West, Fla., announced that Wilson will fly south today to give Mr. Truman an up-to-the-minute report on production. Wilson will take with him his November report on the defense program.

May Discuss Report While Wilson's office said his report to the president was "outstanding" and that arrangements had been made before Mr. Truman left the capital, it acknowledged that it "is possible" the two will discuss the senate subcommittee's report.

Wilson did not refer specifically to the senate report in an address to 300 leading European manufacturers brought here for a firsthand look at U. S. production methods. But he said:

"The fact is that actual deliveries of military end-items now total nearly \$2,000,000,000 worth per month—which is three times what it was this time last year. From now on there will be a steady rise in production, to a peak of about \$4,000,000,000 a month in 1953."

Capitol FEATURE: Detective Story. TYPE: Drama. CAST: Jim McLeod, Kirk Douglas, Mary McLeod, Eleanor Parker; Detective Brody, William Bink; Lieut. Monahan, Horace McMahon; K. A. L. Schneider, George Macready. REVIEWER: Wally Wikoff. STORY: Detective McLeod is one of the best of New York's 21st precinct but his fanatic uprightness is about as bad as the evil he's fighting, especially his hatred for Schneider, an unscrupulous doctor. As various underworld characters and members of the confused general public parade their troubles through the detective headquarters, McLeod hammers at conviction of Schneider—until he finds his wife is dragged into the sordid mess. HIGH POINTS: The choice of actors, every one of whom performs nobly in his or her role. Douglas again leading the field as the uncompromising detective. The technique of being incidental cases brought in to a general pattern with the one scene as the melodramatic frame broken, interplay of tenseness and humor. LOW POINT: The overplayed last scene. VERDICT: Terrific!
