She Lived Among 'Natives'

Edward John Eyre, who explored parts of southern Australia, did his work a little more than a century ago. In South Australia today we find Lake Eyre, which was named in his honor.

Coming on the scene much later was a woman, Mrs. Daisy Bates. Having lost her husband, Mrs. Bates was willing to leave her native England and go to Australia as a reporter for the London Times.

Daisy Bates started her work at the opening of the present century. At that time she was about 41 years of age. The editor had told her to write about the native Australians, commonly known as "blackfellows."

These people to time, and found her living in a small tent of her own. She had a few books to read, but much of her time was spent in making notes about the natives.

Being an excellent student of language, she soon was able to speak with the blackfellows in their own tongue. We are told that she finally learned to speak 125 native dialects!

Natives from many miles distant came to see Mrs. Bates, but they stood at a distance from her tent, waiting for her to come forth to greet them. In their minds, the tent was "magic," it seemed wrong for them to enter it.

This white woman spent much of her time trying to teach the blacks to take care of their health. Sometimes they gave her "magic boards" or other fetishes to keep for them.
