



TIP OF THE MORNING: Alec Templeton, missing too long from radio, will be one of the guests on "The Big Show" over NBC-WIBA Sunday, Dec. 23.

A LONG PROGRAM, every moment packed with exciting dancing, was given Monday night in the Wisconsin Union theater for an audience of almost 1,800 ballet fans; those who weren't fans when they took their seats apparently were by the final curtain, if one can judge by applause.

Ballet Theater was the attraction. With Igor Youskevitch, Alicia Alonso, John Kriza, Mary Ellen Moylan, Ruth Ann Koseun, Eric Braun, and Erik Bruhn in leading roles, the company presented "The Skaters," "Bluebeard," "Schumann Concerto," and, as an added attraction, the "Pas de Deux" from "The Nutcracker."

This program, as you can see, included picturesqueness, abstract beauty, classical movement, and hilarious comedy. The dancers, from the youngest member of the corps de ballet to the long-time stars, created an evening which will be treasured by theatergoers for a long, long time.

Appropriately (in view of the weather) the program opened with "The Skaters," a charming picture of winter sport with the last portion danced in falling snow. Eric Braun made the individual hit of the piece with his leaps and whirls and delicious—one could almost say delicate—sense of humor. Ruth Ann Koseun and Barbara Lloyd also danced in solo work, and the group of eight skaters, cutting figures between the solos and duets, were pleasant to watch in their uniform, but somehow individual, dancing.

Miss Lloyd and Miss Koseun delighted the audience again in "Bluebeard," the former as an elfin suitor of the queen and the latter as the demanding princess, complete with temper tantrums.

In this concluding work, John Kriza was a fabulously lecherous Bluebeard, overplaying the part just to that fine line which separates the truly comic from the merely ludicrous. His dancing, almost overlooked in his great mimicry, was as skillful and sure as any on the stage.
