



TIP O' THE MORNING: It's practically certain now that "The Halls of Ivy" will be on Broadway as a play in the spring of 1952 with the Colmans playing the leads.

"FACE OF YOUTH," a movie produced by the bureau of visual instruction at the University of Wisconsin, is "a first-rate film by almost every standard," according to a review of the picture by Cecile Starr in the Saturday Review of Literature.

The writer describes it as "one of those film surprises a reviewer dreams of but never really expects to stumble on." It tells of two boys, Alex and Ralph, and the help they get from parents and community servants—teachers, nurses, and others.

"Their story," Miss Starr writes, "is most convincingly projected onto the screen, but most exciting is the background feeling which the film conveys. Children can be helped to the happiness that is health while they are young, while there is time. Troubles can be alleviated before they become permanent patterns. The face of youth is soft and smooth and can be molded into an attractive adulthood."

She describes the photography as "fine throughout and in certain scenes... it is superb." And the editing of Ralph's first visit to a psychiatrist and his mother's talk with a social worker is "an example of real skill and imagination," she reports.

The review points out that "Face of Youth" is practically a one-man job by Herman Engel, who researched, wrote, directed, edited, recorded, and, in truth, made the film. His photographer, Martin Lobdell, deserves special mention, as do the university's visual instruction head, Walter Wittlich, and the Wisconsin mental health division's psychiatrist, Dr. Eugenia S. Cameron. Music by Hilmar F. Luckhardt, of the university staff (school of music) adds further to the film's distinctiveness.

In short, the film should be an inspiration to parents, educators, health leaders, sponsors, and makers of non-theatrical films, as well as those of us who occasionally wonder if there is still opportunity for a talented, hard-working, sincere individual to make a film if he wants to make it.

"ALICE": A British film version of "Alice in Wonderland" will be shown at the Madison theater beginning Monday. It received first-rate reviews in the East.

FROM INDIA: The India assn. at the University of Wisconsin will present a program of Indian classical dances and music of the East at 4:15 p. m. Sunday, Jan. 13, in the Wisconsin Union theater.

The program will star Medha von Essen, Bombay-born artist who has studied dance since the age of 7. She is now studying biochemistry and bacteriology at the University of Chicago. Born Medha Yodh, she married a Swedish medical student, Carl von Essen, when both were students at Stanford university.

Mrs. Von Essen learned the Manipuri style dances in Assam, and later the Bharatnatyam style of Tanjore in South India. At Stanford she studied modern dance and was selected for the Stanford chapter of Orchestra, professional dance group.

She will dance a program of both Manipuri and Bharatnatyam dances to orchestral music recorded especially for these rhythms. Instrumental and vocal music will be featured between dances, played on the star, the flute, and the drum by Indians now living in Chicago.

Mrs. Nilima Sen, who comes from Santiniketan, the university established by the Indian poet Rabindranath Tagore, will sing a group of Indian songs. Gaurang B. Hoth will play the star, Gopal Basu the flute, and R. Bhatodekar the drums. The instrumental group accompanied Vashi and Veena when the dancers were introduced to the campus by the India assn. last January.

AT MIDDLETON: Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion posts at Middleton will sponsor a free show for children of the area at 9:30 a. m. Saturday in the Middleton theater. Santa Claus will be on hand to greet the youngsters. Doors will be open at 9 a. m.

UN Groups Back West on Two Big Projects PARIS — (AP) — United Nations (UN) political committees Wednesday gave resounding majorities to the two big projects of the Western powers at this assembly session—their plans for proceedings with disarmament and testing the possibility of unified German elections.

The United States-British-French proposals to set up a disarmament commission and make a new start toward the peaceful goal of limited world armaments was adopted 44 to 5 with 10 countries abstaining and Burma refusing to take part.

In adopting the program the committee by an equally impressive vote turned down Russia's insistent demand for an immediate ban on the atomic bomb, with enforcement of the ban to be left to the future.

That vote was 42 to 6 with nine abstentions.

2,000 Veterans Arrive on Coast from Orient SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — More than 2,000 army, navy, and air force men arrived from the Orient Wednesday aboard the transport Gen. A. E. Anderson.

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Nearing Freedom, Libya to Grant U. S. a Vital Air Base

TRIPOLI, Libya — (AP) — Libya, whose independence is to be proclaimed two days after Christmas, soon will announce an important agreement granting the United States long-term permission to maintain its Wheelus air base here, it was learned from authoritative sources Wednesday.
Britain and France also will receive permission to keep troops in Libya in agreements already reached in principle and due to be signed on Independence day.
Fast-growing Wheelus field is within bomber-striking distance of the Soviet heartland. Two American engineering firms are rushing expansion work at the base. Established with the permission of British occupation authorities, it already is the most important U.S. air installation in Africa.
A qualified source said the agreement already has been reached in principle between U.S. representatives and the provincial Libyan government. The two nations are expected to exchange formal letters of agreement immediately after the proclamation of the independence of Libya, now scheduled for Dec. 27.
The United States consulate refused to discuss the reported agreement. But informants said it is "better" than the pact under which the United States maintains another big air base at Dhahran in Saudi Arabia.
