LOOKING AND LISTENING

Bob Hope Overcomes Many Obstacles on Carrier Show

It is a well known fact that there is a shortage of stage space at NBC in Hollywood, but leave it to Bob Hope to solve the problem. I went with Bob aboard the USS Boxer, considered one of the larger of our aircraft carriers in active duty, for the first transcontinental television broadcast of a comedy show from the deck of a ship. It was the Bob Hope version of "Sound Off" over NBC TV Sunday.

The engineering department had a few problems in setting up for this unusual telecast because of the abundance of steel in the ship's structure which interfered with the microwave line. The kinescope also showed a few flaws because of a difference in electrical cycles; however, before "zero" hour, all was "ship shape."

Rehearsals proved to be more difficult than under ordinary circumstances, due to the open air effect and "old man Sol" beating down into the eyes of the performers. Once during the dress rehearsal, Bob figured the orchestra, directed by Les Brown, had jumped the gun on the cue line, so he stopped the action to correct Les. After checking the script carefully, Hope stepped back to the mike saying, "You're absolutely right, Les, for the first time this year, Guess I'll have to look at the script for a change! He then added, "CBS must have had something to do with this!"

During rehearsals, and particularly this one on the open air flight deck, Bob underplayed his lines, and made a point of not revealing the show's punch remarks, so that at show time, everybody would get into the laugh. "It's very difficult to deliver comedy lines," said the master of monologue, "without an audience reaction, but just what that happens when we do it for real."

There's no question as to how vocally Constance Moore "hit" with the boys. During an after-show performance, Connie was called back again and again. There was lots of fun on board with the "prop" actors in the troupe dressed as admirals, commanders and sailors. When they appeared on deck, rigged out in full uniform and heavy make-up, the regular sailors aboard were goggle-eyed with surprise.

Once again, the "Traveling Ambassador of Comedy" scored a hit with a large and enthusiastic audience... and does he love it! DOWN TV-RADIO ROW... California Relief Bill \$329,000,000

SACRAMENTO, Dec. 28. (AP) Californians paid almost a cent and a half out of each dollar they earned last year to provide relief for less fortunate residents of the state. Charles I. Schottland, state welfare director, says the total relief bill for the state for 1951 will be about \$329,000,000—some \$2,000,000 less than last year. Ten years ago, relief costs took almost five cents out of every dollar earned, Schottland said. Nearly two-thirds of the money spent on relief in 1951 went for old age assistance. Aid to needy children, the blind and general relief made up the rest.

Marshall Stimson, L. A. Attorney, Dies

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 28. (AP) Marshall Stimson, 76, attorney and former president of the Historical Society of Southern California, died yesterday after a week's illness. The veteran lawyer was on the board of Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce from 1907 to 1910. For years he was active in politics. He was a delegate to the Republican National Convention in 1912 and campaigned for Theodore Roosevelt, Calvin Coolidge and Herbert Hoover. Stimson is survived by the widow, Mary, and five children: Gordon Stimson, Los Angeles; Mrs. Sam Haskins, Sierra Madre; Mrs. Eleanor S. Treanor of Elmhurst, Ill., widow of Foreign Correspondent Tom Treanor; Mrs. Harry Murphy, San Jose, and Mrs. Thompson Webb Jr., Madras, Wis.

Valley Councilman Gets Confidence Vote

SAN FERNANDO, Dec. 28. (AP) Councilman William H. Martin received an overwhelming "vote of confidence" at his recall election yesterday. While 512 ballots in favor of his recall, 1624 opposed it. The election followed by one month a similar contest in which the mayor and two councilmen were removed. The recall voting stems from a police department shakeup.

Woman Injured in Gun Accident

NEW YORK, Dec. 28. (AP) A father playing "Fast on the Draw" with his cowboy-minded young son accidentally wounded his wife last night. The boy, 11-year-old James Haynes Jr., had pleaded with his father, a penitentiary corrections commissioner, "Dad, let's see how fast you can draw." Haynes, 32, unloaded his revolver and played the game with his son. Then Haynes reloaded the gun and started to put it away. "Just once more," came the youngster's plea. Forgetting about the bullets, Haynes drew again and fired. The shot struck his wife, Ada, 30, in the forehead. She was seriously injured. Police said the shooting was an accident.
