'I Know My Love'

TIP OF THE MORNING: Watch for major movie buildups of Audrey Hepburn (star of "Gigi") and Rosamary Clooney.

ALFRED LUNT and Lynn Fontanne will co-star in the first radio performance of "I Know My Love" on "Theater Guild on the Air" via NBC-WIBA at 7:30 p. m. Sunday.

The production will be of more than usual interest to Wisconsin audiences. Lunt is a native of Milwaukee, and the couple (they were married in 1922) lives at Genesee Depot when not acting.

Besides this, the Lunts opened the Wisconsin Union theater in 1939 with four sold-out performances of "The Taming of the Shrew," returned in 1941 with "There Shall Be No Night" and in 1946 with "O Mistress Mine," and made the theater the scene of two world premieres—those of "The Pirate" and the play which they will introduce to radio Sunday night, "I Know My Love."

Both performers had considerable success individually, but they hit their real strides when they teamed in 1924 in "The Guardsman." In 1949, they observed their 25th anniversary of this first co-starring venture by appearing in a play which opened with the Lunts as a couple celebrating a golden wedding day.

Greyhound Buys American Buslines

CHICAGO (AP)—The Greyhound Corp. will buy the American Bus Lines for about \$3,000,000 worth of stock, it announced Thursday.

The purchase is subject to Interstate Commerce Commission approval.

The American lines operate 10,000 route miles in 29 states. It includes the Fort & Burlington Transportation Co. and owns the entire capital stock of Gibson Lines of California and of the Muscatine, Davenport and Clinton Co.

It also owns 50 per cent of the stock of the Denver-Colorado Springs-Pueblo Motorway, Inc., and of the Denver-Salt Lake City-Pacific Stages, Inc.

American's gross revenues for 1951 were about \$11,250,000.

Orrville S. Caesar, Greyhound president, said American's service in the Rocky Mountain states will help his company in "one of the few areas not adequately served at present by Greyhound."

The purchase terms call for exchange of one share of preferred Greyhound stock for each share of American preferred and for each \$100 par value of American debentures.

State Purchases, Prices of Tobacco to be Publicized

For the first time in the history of the Wisconsin tobacco industry, daily composite reports of purchases by dealers and prices paid will be compiled by the marketing division of the Wisconsin state department of agriculture.

These reports will be released to the press and radio daily, according to M. R. Goodell, department tobacco marketing specialist. They will include the number of bales purchased, as well as the high, low, and average prices paid per pound by type and grade.

This information is being gathered in an effort to give growers and dealers a clearer picture of the current Wisconsin tobacco market and as a means of developing a more orderly market for the crop, Goodell said.

Last year a weekly tobacco marketing report was compiled. Because of the need for more information on tobacco marketing, the service is being expanded this year to a daily report.

Life Magazine May Back Ike

NEW YORK (UP)—Life magazine said in an editorial Thursday that it probably will support Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower for president, if he is the Republican candidate this year.

"If Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower is the Republican candidate for president this year, the editors of Life will probably give him the enthusiastic support," the editorial began.

It said Eisenhower's qualities "should be made available to the American people. There is evidence that the people would support his nomination if given the chance."

The editorial said that Life's editors are "a little disturbed" that Eisenhower's official campaign "is not off to a very strong start." It added that his "would-be supporters" can at least review the reasons Eisenhower would make a good president.
