WHETHER YOU LIKE OR merely tolerate Vaughn Monroe's voice, you'll have to admit he put on a mighty good show for two audiences Monday night at the Parkway theater, At least 2,000 persons made their way through the snow to hear the maestro and his company in the pair of perform-

This reviewer admittedly is not a Monroe fan, as far as his voice is concerned. But his band and his showmanship are other matters, sufficient in themselves to insure a happy evening, so a discussion of his vocalizing isn't necessary, except to say that it's better than that of one of his soloists. Wally

Striking arrangements, enchanced by a variety of instruments in capable hands, were the strong points of the program. Such purely instrumental numbers as "Jealousy' were beautifully done, with superb contrasts and exceptional solo work. Mainly, however, they depended upon their mass effects

and the men's skills; even the drummer had to read music. Most of Mouroe's hit records were reproduced during the two hours of music and fun, including "Sound Off," "Riders

in the Sky," and others. Ziggy Talent stepped out of the ranks for a set of comedy numbers in his unsuccessfully imitated style; acrobatic eyes and bodily contortions added to the fun. Ruth Winston of the Moon Maids was another soloist, doing 'Granada" and a couple of other numbers in pleasant operetta style.

Earle Hummel, violinist of the orchestra, won rounds of applause with "Hora Staccato," Dawes' "Melody," and "Jamaican Rhumba" all executed well with a minimum of a fancy exertion.

Added attractions were Roy Benson, a comedian who was really funny while he kidded his own magic (a rare thing, believe me) and who turned out to be an adroit juggler as well, and Dick Haymen, a flashy harmonica player who injected fun into his act with a duel with one-note Monroe and a take-off on Spike Jones.


