

'The Drunkard'

TIP O' THE MORNING: You'll hear more about "self-policing" of radio and television to prevent federal intervention—direct result of recent lapses from good taste in both media.

OLD-TIME melodrama will return to Madison this week, when the Little Hollywood Players move into the American Legion ballroom with their production of "The Drunkard."

This will be something of a "history-repeats-itself" deal, because another company did the same play in the same place for several weeks a good many years ago — before World War II, at any rate.

Ed Morgan, one of the original Hollywooders, will play the title role, and Paul F. Hunter will be the villain. Virginia Enoch will play the drunkard's wife, and Marilyn Morgan will portray "mad Agnes." Others in the cast will include George Bird and Sidney Wright. All but Wright were with the company at Club Hollywood in the autumn.

The Players will continue their "vaudeville-between-the-acts" policy, and have scheduled an operatic satire, a burlesque ballet, magic, singing, and comedy turns.

Performances will be at 8:30 p. m. Thursday through Saturday.



NEW JOB: His new contract as musical director of the CBS "Playhouse on Broadway" makes Elliot Lawrence, 26-year-old pianist-composer-bandleader, the youngest musical director of any major radio or TV network series. Lawrence will do the composing, scoring, arranging and conducting for the show in addition to special choral arrangements. Lawrence, who is also musical director for King records, is an honor graduate of the University of Pennsylvania. He majored in music and won the school's Thornton Oakley award. At 19 he became musical director for station WCAU in Philadelphia, where his CBS "Listen to Lawrence" series launched him on a career of musical stardom. He studied further with Leon Barzin, head of the National Orchestral assn., and Erno Balogh, concert pianist.

AMATEUR HOUR: Betty Ann Severson, soprano from Sioux Falls, S. Dak., will be a contestant on the "Original Amateur Hour" (ABC-WISC) at 8 p. m. Thursday.

Miss Severson is a friend of Mrs. Russell Jensen, 32 Craig ave., Black Hawk park, who knew her when the singer was a pupil at the school for the blind at Gary, S. Dak.

The soprano has been sightless since birth.

DISCS OF THE DAY: "Preludes, Opus 28," Chopin, recorded by Claudio Arrau (Columbia). An exceptionally fine Chopin album from every point of view—Arrau's clean phrasing, poetic sense, and intimate feeling for the composer, plus first-rate engineering.

SAFETY CHAIRMAN: Eddie Cantor has been named 1952 chairman of the motion picture and radio committee of the National Safety Council.

Cantor, who succeeded Phil Harris, was inducted recently in ceremonies at the Ambassador hotel in Los Angeles, Calif. Robert Young, star of "Father Knows Best," was principal speaker at the dinner.

Cantor, who stars in his own NBC-WIBA program Tuesdays, will be honored at a dinner at Hotel Commodore in New York Thursday, on the occasion of his 60th birthday. Guests will pay \$1,000 per plate in savings bonds for Israel.

Because of prevailing high costs, depreciation and amortization covered only \$12,601,000.00 of this amount.

The expenditures listed above used up all of the \$299,653,000.00 taken in during the year, plus \$14,300,000.00 from the sale of new equipment trust certificates and \$11,958,000.00 from working capital saved in prior years.
