



TIP O' THE MORNING: Music from the March of Dimes ball in both the Park and the Lorraine hotels will be broadcast by WIBA the night of Jan. 31.

Claudio Arrau is the kind of pianist who, just as you think he has exhausted his instrument's resources, finds more to exploit with his skill and understanding.

The Chilean musician played the first of two concerts Tuesday night; he will give the same rounded program in the theater at 8 tonight. On it were music of Beethoven, Mendelssohn, Brahms, Debussy, and Kravandos. Recalled to the stage by a demonstrative audience, Arrau played "Polish Song," Chopin-Liszt, and Chopin's "Fourth Etude." These took care of a hitherto regrettable absence of Chopin from the scheduled program.

Brahms' "Variations on a Theme of Paganini" probably best explain the artist's complete mastery of the piano, for it showed his great power, his prodigious speed and contrasting grace, his fluency in changing moods and colors, and his brilliant sense of melody—a gamut of talents seldom matched.

Even then, there was more to come—fresh, new colors in Debussy's "Pour le Piano," exciting rhythms in Granados' "El Pelele," and poetry in "The Maiden and the Nightingale."

Early in the evening, Arrau showed his flawless technique in Beethoven's "Rondo in G Major" and his ability at interpretation in the same composer's "Les Adieux" sonata, with moments of grandeur and its fitting melodies. Then came Mendelssohn's "Rondo Capriccioso," hinting at fairies and elves, and his utterly beautiful "Song Without Words (G major)."

La Crosse Man Gets Term on Mail Charge Federal Judge Patrick Stone imposed an 18-months sentence Tuesday upon Marshall E. Frank, 35, La Crosse upholsterer and woodworker, on a guilty plea to a charge of obtaining merchandise by false credit references involving "use of the mails to defraud."

Raymond Potack, 28, Chippewa Indian with a three-year overseas war record and no previous criminal record was granted a year's probation when he admitted burning another Indian's cabin while drunk on the Lac Court Orellias reservation.

But two other Indians, both parolees, failed to win leniency. Alvin Elk, 25, who "borrowed a car and didn't return it" to the owner, a resort operator on the Lac Court Orellias reservation, was given a six-months term, concurrent with the remainder of a 17-months state prison term if he is "broke up" for violation of parole and to be served in federal prison if he isn't.

And Henry Wayman, Superior, was ordered to serve a suspended year's sentence for larceny because, while on probation, he was convicted last fall of "shining deer" in Price county.

Judge Refuses to Reopen Case of Sentenced Youth

A plea to reopen the case of Herbert Weiland, 23, Milwaukee youth now serving an eight-year prison sentence imposed here in November, 1950, was refused Tuesday by Federal Judge Patrick T. Stone.

Weiland, who received consecutive terms of five and three years for transporting a stolen car from Wisconsin to Missouri, "glorified crime," the judge said. State Assemblyman Robert Landry, (D-Milwaukee), retained by Weiland's mother, asked permission to withdraw the boy's guilty plea on grounds that the case was "rushed" and that Weiland was "confused, bewildered, and frightened."

His parents were divorced when he was a child, and the youth was a "prize example" of instability created by a broken home, Landry said. And a letter from prison recently received by his mother, showed a change of attitude toward life. Landry claimed, but Stone retorted: "When the devil was sick, the devil a monk would be. When the devil was well, the devil a monk was he."

The boy's entire criminal record, dating back to the age of eight, stamped him as one who had determined to "live at the expense of others," the judge added. While Weiland was sentenced for transporting a stolen car, the same offense was connected with a series of armed robberies, and the court pointed out that guns and dynamite were found in the car when Weiland was arrested in Illinois after escaping from the Richland county jail.
