

VERA CASPARY'S "LAURA," murder mystery familiar to many through its previous appearance between covers and on screens, had its first Madison stage performance Thursday night at West high school, when the Madison Theater Guild sent some shivers down the spectators' backs.

The story involved, mainly, a girl who apparently was killed in the prolog but who returned in Act One; the detective assigned to the case-who fell in love with a portrait of the supposedly murdered girl, and her long-time friend, a writer,

The players assigned these roles did a usually competent job. except that Jeanne Remus Neher (in the title part) was more than competent. She drew a pretty accurate picture of the advertising writer whose attraction for men almost caused her death, a girl entangled in a web woven by her own beauty and personality.

Subdued in her performance most of the time, she created some high moments of dramatic tension and, through her interpretation of the girl's temperament, helped heighten the play's mystery.

Rex Rucker was the detective-the strong, silent type except during a 10-hour session with the magnetic Laura which kept him talking about himself instead of about her. Most of the time, he had a suitable intensity, with a suggestion of underplaying the part-a manner which at the end of the second act became a fault instead of a virtue. since it reduced the impact of the scene's ellmax.

Ralph Hunter DeSha was the writer. Usually good and credible, he took the playwrights' description of him as "precious" and "a poseur" a bit too literally. Russell Shank was the Laura-worshiping son of the apartment

house's janitors, still a spoiled brat at 19 or 20. Kenneth E. Buzzell played the rough, stuffed-shirt affianced to Laura. Lols Klein, Doke Yost, and J. Fyfe Frederickson made brief

but impressive appearances in minor roles. The setting and lighting were first-rate, and Al Barraclough' direction kept the solution well hidden, the suspense present most of
