

A week ago I spoke about the discovery of the remains of scores of Swiss lake villages. Study of the tools left by people of the villages showed that many of them lived in what is known as the Late Stone blades of axes or hatchets. It was plain that they had been used with wooden handles.

Along with stone tools, there were some tools made of copper, others of bronze. The metal tools dug up from the lake bottoms indicate that they had been used with how long ago the villages existed during a long period, passing from the Late Stone Age into the early part of the Age of Metals. No one can tell exactly how long ago the villages existed but it is safe to say that the remains date back several thousand years.






