The ball was raided and the men landed in a Turkish bath establishment for women, inhabit tor the time by the shy co-ed, the friends' wives, the mother-in-la of one of the friends, a burlesque queen, etc.

From then on, the complications piled upon each other, with the usual incredibility and happy solution.

As for the cast, it had two good actors-Rolf Forsberg as t professor and Patricla Garber as the girl.

The others were fairly satisfactory, Maybe, though, the fall exuberance and the phony excitement were due more to the dire tor than to the actors. If so, let credit go where credit is due.

#### Reich Hits France Over Saar Dispute

BONN, Germany —(U.R)— West Germany Tuesday accused France of attempting to transform the disputed, coal-rich Saar basin into a separate state.

The Bonn government warned, angrily, that such an attempt will prejudice an ultimate Franco-German peace treaty.

The charges were aired at a press conference Walter Hallstein. Germany's secretary of state for foreign affairs, after an emergency session of the cabinet, called to discuss the sudden flare-up of German anger over the Saar issue. A major holdup in plans for a European army, including 12 German divisions, threatens to result from the Saar dispute.



MINNEAPOLIS—(UP)— A man who saved his dog from a tenement house fire may have unintentionally fanned the blaze into a holocaust that took 17 lives,

a fire investigator said Tuesday. The 17 trapped in the fire Mon-day included 11 children, Firemen who dug through the ice-crusted ruins all night and Tuesday had

recovered 14 bodies. Fire Investigator Arthur Thompson said that the unwitting act of Hellmuth Schoenfeldt, 44, in saving his dog may have spread the fire through the dilapidated three-

Thompson said Schoenfeldt, who occupied a store at the rear of the building, was awakened about 4 a.m. Monday when his dog, "Lady,"

lapped his face. He said Schoenfeldt kicked one door open and escaped.

Once outside, Schoenfeldt discovered the dog was still inside, whining and scratching at a second door. He then kicked open the second door to let the dog escape.
"When he kicked the second door

in a fresh blast of oxygen hit the fire and you might as well have thrown gasoline on the flames," Thompson said.
