

TIP OF THE MORNING: Downbeat magazine quotes "reputable" sources as saying Stan Kenton will reorganize his band for its spring tour, and "retreat to a more marketable style of music."

MINIATURE MARILYN MORGAN, as riotous a comedienne as ever graced a melodrama, made herself the star of "The Drunkard" at its opening performance Thursday night in the American Legion ballroom, and she didn't need her five roles to do it. Any one would have been enough.

Funny as ever, the Little Hollywood Players had moved into Madison from Club Hollywood to restart their season with a hilarious version of the old play, hammed up with everything from extensive mustaches and plastic cues to a few bars of "Shrimp Boats" and a curtain that misbehaved.

The company, which plays with gay abandon and stoops to the slapstick of puns, will do the same show each Thursday, Friday, and Saturday for three weeks, then will rest up (and the actors will certainly need the rest) for a week before attempting mayhem on another drama.

Miss Morgan appeared as (1) a feeble old woman, (2) an insane girl with overtones of a super-mad Ophelia, (3) a thieving, raucous child, (4) a soloist in a between-the-acts song, and (5) the overstuffed prima donna of a burlesque on "Carmen."

Edwin T. Morgan played the title role, which included a few moments of delirium tremens, with just the right touch of light sarcasm.

Virginia Rauch portrayed his ever-loving wife and, for one scene, an impossible messenger boy. Paul Hunter was properly hissable as the villain and George Bird played the pure-hearted lad who always bobbed up at the right time. Sydney Wright was variously a bartender, a temperance worker, and a farmer.

Gregory Black's old-time piano-playing was an integral part of the comedy, and Rod MacDonald's master-of-ceremonizing sparkled. Between the acts there were, besides Miss Morgan's solo and "Carmen," a vocal number by Wright, quartet by Bird, and "Sweet Adeline" by the worst imitation of a male quartet you can imagine.

Community singing and MacDonald's coaching on the lisses, boos, and cheers added to the atmosphere.

U. S. Offers for Sale War-Seized Company WASHINGTON — (UP) — The Justice Department Thursday offered for sale a \$14,000,000 war-seized German drug firm whose operation by the government figures in demand for an investigation of the alien property custodian's office.

Sale of the Schering Corp. of Bloomfield, N. J., to the highest bidder may lead to lower prices for anti-histamines, sex hormones, and sulfa drugs. Its disposal will make hundreds of patents available to other firms either free or for "reasonable" royalties.

Money obtained from sale of the firm's 440,000 shares of capital stock will be used to pay claims of Americans interned by Axis nations or held as prisoners of war.

The Senate Judiciary committee last Monday approved a resolution by Sen. Alexander Wiley (R-Wis.), to spend \$100,000 to "examine and review" the operations of the alien property custodian's office which has controlled Schering for almost 10 years.

Wisconsin Family Found in Home Without Food, Fuel HORTONVILLE — (U.P.) — Three children were in a hospital Thursday after police found a Hortonville family huddled in their home during 14 below zero weather without fuel and only part of a can of milk for food.

George Elsie, county policeman, said he found the mother and three young children ill in bed Tuesday night when he investigated a neighbor's complaint.

A 14-year-old daughter was firing a wood furnace, but there was only one stick of fuel left, he said. Officers also found a portion of a can of milk and no other food in the house.

The three children, 4, 6, and 7 years old, were taken to a New London hospital, where doctors said one of them had a 101 degree temperature.

Their father told police he didn't have any money. He is employed at a Neenah mill.

"I keep asking for my check ahead of time," he said. A Hortonville restaurant operator donated bread, meat, coffee and two quarts of milk for the older daughter and the mother after neighbors provided fuel.

FOND DU LAC—(UP)—Ervin E. Lashay, 22, was sentenced to serve one to 12 years in prison Thursday after admitting a \$227 tavern hold-up near here.

Lashay also was given a concurrent 12 to 15-month term for car theft. Robert J. Schilline, 20, entered no plea at his arraignment and was ordered to Winnebago State hospital for a mental examination. Both men are Fond du Lac residents.

They were charged with holding up the Kinker's Corners tavern Monday. They were arrested the next day.

The pair was accused of stealing a car Sunday and then holding up Mrs. Francis Bindert, wife of the tavern operator, after all the establishment's patrons left early Monday.

Governor Approves 3 Highway Projects (By The United Press) Gov. Walter Kohler Thursday approved three highway projects in Milwaukee, Shawano, and Trempealeau counties totaling \$243,131.


The largest contract, for \$137,603, covers 3.5 miles of bituminous pavement on State Highway 100

south from Hales Corners in Milwaukee county, and a half-mile stretch on State Highway 24 in Hales Corners.

An \$88,938 contract is for grading and draining of 5.3 miles of State Highway 93 between Tamarack and Arcadia in Trempealeau county.

The third contract, for \$16,690, is for a steel and concrete bridge on Shawano County Trunk M over the Embarrass river.
