TIP O' THE MORNING: Watch for national advertisers to start sponsoring more local programs across the country.

HARRY CAMPBELL, WWB farm director, has been in Madison this week recording interviews at Farm and Home week for broadcast on his "Country Hour" program (5 a. m., Monday through Friday).

Bob Dick, program director of WIBA and WIBA-FM, and **Earl Fessler**, a manager of WFOV, will have new radio roles Sunday. They will be guest book-reviewers on Ralph Peterson's "It Is Later Than You Think" over WFOV at 5:30 p. m. The trio will discuss "Frequency Modulation," by Nathan Marchand.

Arthur Godfrey may have set some kind of a record Monday. His takeoff from Florida was delayed by bad weather, and he conducted his morning show on CBS-WKOW from his plane 5,000 feet in the air. This probably was the first time that a 90-minute commercial program originated under such conditions.

Frederic Franklin, No. 1 dancer of the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, began his career early, studying both dancing and piano. Once he accompanied the French singer, Mistinguette, when she appeared in a show at the Cafe de Paris, where he was dancing. The Ballet Russe will be at the Parkway theater Mar. 3 and 4.

Karl Swenson, whom you hear in "Lorenzo Jones," "Mr. Chameleon," "Evelyn Winters," and other radio shows, and **Jean Tompkins**, star of "Against the Storm," were married Jan. 28. They met on another serial, "Pursuit of Happiness."

Leon Janney, who as a child played "Penrod" on the screen, has joined the cast of "The Strange Romance of Evelyn Winters" (ABC-WISC).

Meredith Wilson will give all royalties from his new hymn, "Banners and Bayonets," to the Salvation Army.

If you repeat **Katy Jurado's** full name, you'll need a deep breath. The girl who plays opposite Gary Cooper in "High Noon" is Maria Cristina Estrella Marcella Jurado Garcia.

Ella Kasan and **Tennessee Williams**, director and writer respectively of "A Streetcar Named Desire," will be teamed again in "Mississippi Woman," based on a group of Williams' short plays. He is working on the script at Key West, Fla., while Kasan is in New York directing a stage production of Irene Mayer Selznick—producer of the stage version of "Streetcar."

WHENCE THEY COME: The movie talent scouts, whose business it is to scour the country for new actors and screen personalities, have yet to decide which part of the nation is the most likely source—but if the current personnel rosters at the Warner studio are any criterion, the palm must be handed to the Midwest.

Janny Thomas and **Doris Day**, both from Ohio, are currently topping "I'll See You in My Dreams," Dennis Morgan of Wisconsin and **John Crawford**, who grew up in Kansas City, co-star in "This Woman Is Dangerous" with David Brian of New York. **Richard Carlson** of Minnesota and **Frank Lovejoy**, a New Yorker who got his first big professional break on radio in Cincinnati, share top honors in Milton Sperling's U. S. Pictures production of "Retreat, Hell!"

Virginia Mayo of St. Louis has the title role in "She's Working Her Way through College," co-starring with Illinois' Ronald Reagan. Reagan, who used to be a radio announcer in Iowa will also be seen as "Alexander, the Big Leaguer."

Don't get the impression that the Midwest is a must, however, for Warner stars. There's plenty of competition from other places, most notably New York state. **Gordon MacRae** and **Eddie Bracken** in "About Face," **Kirk Douglas** of "The Big Trees," and **Burt Lancaster** of "The Crimson Pirate" are all New Yorkers, and **Abbott and Costello** first began thinking of "Jack and the Beanstalk" in their native New Jersey.

But the Midwest can counter with **Omaha's Marion Brando** of "A Streetcar Named Desire," **Lucille Norman**, also a native of Omaha and an alumna of the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, who co-stars in "Carson City" with Dixie's Randolph Scott; **Patrice Wymore**, the lovely Kansan appearing opposite Kirk Douglas in "The Big Trees"; and **Jane Wyman** of Missouri, whose next is the co-starring role with **Will Rogers, Jr.**, in "The Story of Will Rogers."

The Warner roster also lists **Cary Grant** and **Ray Milland** from England, **Ray Bolger** and **Ruth Roman** from Boston, **Joel McCrea** and **Sue Cochran** from California, and **Allyn McLerie** and **Yvonne de Carlo** from Canada.

In reporting **Ray Bolger's** soon-due co-starring with **Doris Day** in "April in Paris," none bothered to find out whether **Gordon MacRae**, supposed to be opposite Day, was still in it. He's suddenly out! What the beet was that caused the exit, studio won't tell. Did learn, though, that this Warner musical gets a quick rewrite to increase dance numbers for Bolger's nimble feet and lessen the accent on singing. Hope that doesn't sacrifice too many of the eight tunes **Vernon Duke** and **Sammy Cahn** have already whipped up for "April."

Gene Tierney, who'll be over-seeing for several months anyway, may be snagged for the femme lead in "Boccaccio's Loves," for which director **Hugo Freagonese** has already sailed to Spain.

Gall Russell, supposed to start work opposite **George Raft** in "Loan Shark" this week, can't. She's quite ill. **Deborah Hart** has been chosen to replace her.

Jack Dempsey has checked in at **Paramount** for the part of the fight referee he'll play in "Military Policeman" with **Bob Hope** and **Mickey Rooney**.

Jimmy Davis, former governor of Louisiana, is back in **Filmville** and would be happy to listen to picture offers. The Gov appeared in quite a few not so long ago, if you remember.

Paul Douglas and **Jan Sterling** are giving up that enormous **Bel Air** mansion they've been renting and have moved to a hotel. The place where they've been parking actually has a 300-foot swimming pool in the form of a wide stream through the grounds!

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By Oswald Jacoby

Many of the nation's bridge experts are beginning a long week-end today by playing in the first session of the Life Masters Pair Championship in New York.

The weekend will close with the Life Masters Individual Championship.

An individual contest is a very trying experience to most experts. You play a few hands with a partner, then change partners. Altogether, you have to adapt yourself to 50 or 60 other partners, each time agreeing in a few seconds about the methods you will use for about two hands.

The individual is usually won by a great player, but he needs more than great skill for his victory.

He must also have a calm easy-going temperament, and he must be able to get along with 50 or 60 prima donnas.

Sounds like a cinch, doesn't it? **Sidney Sidorov**, of Philadelphia, was the miracle man who won last year's Individual Championship.

Today's hand shows an example of his skill.

West opened the queen of spades, and the suit was continued until Sidorov ruffled the third round.

He laid down the ace of hearts and discovered the bad news about the trump suit.

Sidney saw that he could afford to lose only one more trick—to the ace of diamonds.

He would have to get to dummy once for a trump finesse and twice more for diamond finesses. This meant that he would need three entries to dummy.

Sidorov therefore led a low club from his hand and blithely finessed dummy's ten.

When that remarkable finesse held, he returned the ten of hearts from dummy. East covered with the queen, and declarer won and drew a third trump.

Now he left the last trump out in order to turn his attention to the diamonds.

He entered dummy with the queen of clubs and returned a diamond to finesse the ten.

When allowed to hold this trick he entered dummy again with the ace of club and finessed the jack of diamonds.

West could take the ace of diamonds, but could do nothing to defeat the contract.

He actually led another diamond, the ace, but Sidorov won the king and at last could draw the last trump.
