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JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By Oswald Jacoby

The Australian Olympic was conducted in many countries last November, with 16 bridge hands in one session and then 16 more a week later.

Today's hand is selected from the first set of 18.

West opens the five clubs, and East takes the queen and ace of clubs, following with a third club. South's jack wins the third round of clubs, of course.

South can now expect to discard his low hearts on dummy's diamonds, so that he can afford to lose one trump trick and still make his contract.

Expecting no trouble, he leads a low trump to dummy's king.

West's discard reveals the sad truth about the trumps. There is grave danger that South will lose two trump tricks.

South must abandon trumps at once in order to run the diamonds. On the third and fourth diamonds South discards low hearts.

Fortunately, East must follow suit. Dummy next takes the ace of hearts, and now East is down to four trumps and so is South.

A low heart is led from dummy, and East is obliged to ruff with the seven of spades.

Does South over-ruff with the jack?

That would lose the contract. No matter how South continued, he would then lose two trump tricks.

South must under-ruff with the four of spades.

Now East must lead from his queen-nine-eight of spades. No matter how he squirms he must yield the last three tricks to declarer.

A very ingenious idea, in my opinion.

Grandmother, 76, to Fulfill Dream, Enters University

DETROIT—(UP)—A 76-year-old Negro grandmother will enter Wayne university today to start the college education that long has been her dream.

Mrs. Virginia Fountain is aiming for a degree too, "if it doesn't take too long."

A widow, she decided to fulfill her ambition despite her age so she can keep ahead of "my children." Her children are the 12 to 14-year-olds at the Methodist church where Mrs. Fountain teaches Sunday school.

"You know how these children are," Mrs. Fountain said. "You have to know what you're talking about to keep ahead of them."

Mrs. Fountain's formal education didn't start until her husband died and her two children, a boy and a girl, "were able to take care of themselves."

Then she came here to live with her daughter, Mrs. Ernestine Tarrant, from her native Alabama where she said "all they let Negroes learn then was how to keep the school clean." She had had only three months of school.

When she was 53, Mrs. Fountain entered Winger grade school. She worked as a housekeeper to finance her way through grade and finally into high school, where good grades won her a scholarship to college.
