

**SPOTLIGHT** Kirsten Flagstad

**TIP OF THE MORNING:** Movie films are almost certain to premiere more and more top films in smaller communities than in metropolitan centers. Recent successes with such experiments are the reason.

ONE OF THE GREAT VOICES of this musical era—and perhaps of any—was heard by a Madison audience for the first time Monday night when Kirsten Flagstad gave the first of three recitals in the Wisconsin Union theater.

This could be the city's last chance to applaud the Norwegian soprano, for she will end her career with the end of the current season. She will sing again at 8 p.m. Wednesday and Saturday in the same theater; the Wednesday concert will be the same as Monday's, but the Saturday program will be different.

Aside from the magnetic vocal quality, the knowing musicianship, and the amazing versatility of Mme. Flagstad, one is impressed at once with the youthfulness of which marks many of her songs. She has the unusual ability of changing the timbre of her voice even at a given pitch, to say nothing of shifting it from joy to melancholy in a single song.

Best known as a Wagnerian singer, Mme. Flagstad sang only one aria Monday night—the "Liebestod" from "Tristan and Isolde." She wove the operatic spell magically, despite the absence of an orchestra; a missed Wagnerian sonorities even though Edward Hart's accompaniment here, as all through the evening, was high grade.

Mme. Flagstad had programmed 20 songs besides the aria, and added three encores—"I Love Thee," "When I Have Sung My Songs," and "Morning." Obviously, one cannot mention all. Forced to choose a few, a reviewer must name the rich reverence of Bach's "Komm Susser Tod," the joyful worship of "Auf, Auf Zu Gottes Lob," the romance of "Nacht und Traume," the swing of "Ungeud," the suggested drama of "Nu Brister I Alle de Kloester."

**Orchestra Concert:** Soulima Stravinsky, pianist son of composer Igor Stravinsky, will be soloist with the University of Wisconsin Symphony orchestra in a Sunday Music hour at 4:15 p.m. Mar. 9 in the Wisconsin Union theater. Prof. Richard C. Church will conduct.

**MUSIC COMPETITION:** A composer's contest again will be a part of the Little Theater programs at the Wisconsin State fair next August. Prizes will total \$350.

Any composers now residents of Wisconsin may submit manuscripts to Mrs. Frank Suetholz, 6532 W. Lloyd st., Milwaukee 13, Wis. Deadline is June 1. None postmarked after that date will be considered.

Each work must bear a non de plume and must be accompanied by an envelope containing the composer's name and address with the non de plume on the outside. The envelope also must contain a brief biography, return postage, and a fee of \$1.

"No composition may be submitted," the rules say, "which has previously been published, publicly performed under professional auspices, or awarded a prize in other competition."

Prizes will be awarded in seven classifications: Instrumental ensemble, trio, or quartet (other than strings); string quartet; vocal ensemble; organ solo; piano solo; piano concerto or two-piano work; song.


**Madison Firm Sued for \$133,311 Damages**  
The A. S. Schulman Electric Co., Chicago, filed suit in Madison federal court Monday to recover \$133,311 damages from John Urse and Julius Ruskin, Madison, for alleged breach of contract.  
The Madison men, under the name of Capitol Tree Experts, 1006 Merrill Springs rd., entered into a contract at \$50,000 to clear a right of way for a 32-mile transmission line between Wood River and Vandalia, Ill., but abandoned the job after completing only one mile, the complaint said.  
The Schulman firm alleged it was compelled to complete the job at a cost of \$176,961. Gordon Shynkin, LaFollette, Shynkin, and Doyle, is Madison attorney for the plaintiff.


