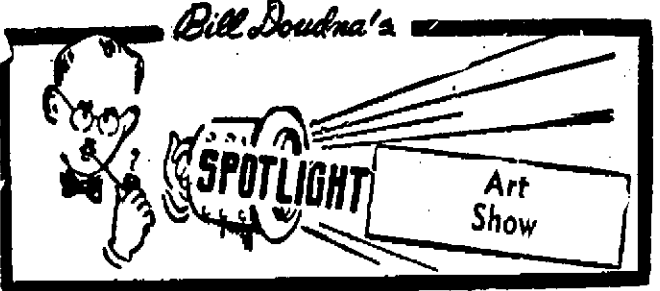

SUPERSTITION went by the boards this year. The Madison Artists exhibition, now on view in Scanlan hall, is the 13th in the series—and the largest. Exactly 123 works by 81 artists are being shown.
And, for the first time since 1940, the show has a printed catalog. Edited by Mrs. Walter Ela, secretary of the sponsoring Madison Art assn., it has a cover by Prof. James Watrous of the university art history department.
Most of the works are for sale or rent, or both. Those available for rental can be borrowed at a rate of 10 per cent of the purchase price for a year, 5 per cent for six months. Rental payments can be applied toward purchase.
Paintings in oil, tempera, and encaustic predominate in the exhibition, with 52 on display. There are 23 water colors, caseins, and pastels; 21 graphics; 11 pieces of sculpture, and 16 ceramic pieces.
The show will close Mar. 8.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Bridge fans who have never played in a tournament may be puzzled when they read about the "swing" hands in the Vanderbilt Cup Tournament, which begins in New York Thursday night.

It is less puzzling if you remember that the Vanderbilt is a contest for bridge teams of four players per team.
Let's suppose that in one of these contests a team of four women is playing against a team of four men.
The women would occupy the North and South seats at one table, with men in the East and West seats. In another room the arrangement would be different, with the other two women occupying the East and West seats, and the two men North and South.

Let's suppose that a hand comes along in which most of the high cards are dealt to North and South. In the first room, the two women hold those high cards. The hand will eventually be played in the second room, where the two men will hold those high cards.

If the teams are evenly matched, the men and the women will get the same result with those identical high cards. If they get different results, that difference is called a "swing."
An unusual example of a swing, produce "The Grass Harp". What a parley!

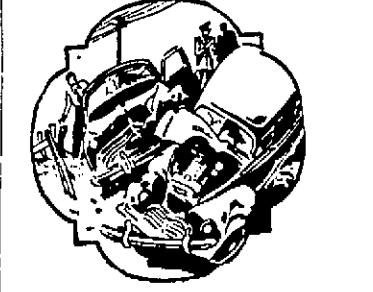

of clubs, ruffed a club in dummy with the nine of hearts, and then led the king of hearts from dummy. East could not take the ace of hearts, but then South could claim the rest. The slam was worth a score of 1660 points in this room. In the other room the bidding began in much the same way. When West bid five spades, however, North doubled—and South allowed the double to stand.
The contract of five spades, played by West, could have been defeated if North had opened a club. Instead, North opened the king of hearts, and West made the contract.
West began by taking the first trick with the ace of hearts.
He drew three rounds of trumps and then took five diamond tricks, discarding two clubs in the process. He could then give up one heart and one trump, scoring 850 points for making his contract.
The winning team got 1660 points in the first room and 850 points in the second room for a "swing" of 2510 points.
