

Johansen lent a note of jollity to the hotnpipe of the arcell suite, which otherwise was grave and somewhat

udied in its care for form. Three sonatas completed the program: Beethoven's

Moonlight," Schubert's A-major, and the Chopin.

Johansen's thoughtful playing saved the too-familiar bening of the Beethoven sonata from triteness, and gave e second movement a poetic feeling. Then he loosed some of his wer and fire to bring out the urgency of the closing "presto itato."


The Schubert work is full of melody-almost enough for another peretta than "Blossom Time." The tunes are simple ones, but they we the beauty of a Schubert song, and some have the lilt of a rauss waltz.

Less familiar than other Chopin works, the B-minor sonata erflows with musical ideas-it has lyricism, grandeur, power, and rilliance. Its final movement, in particular, demands the utmost tistry, to say nothing of skill. to Meet'on Campus

In all of it, Johansen was the true virtuoso.



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
