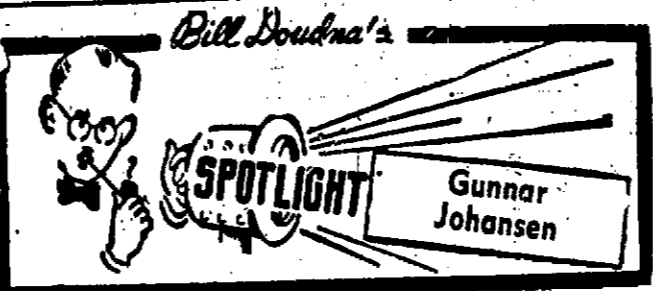

IT WAS ANOTHER OVATION for Gunnar Johansen after his piano recital Sunday in the Wisconsin Union theater, and again it was a reception wholly earned by the University of Wisconsin musician.

The theater was nearly full for this Sunday Music hour, 249th in the series. This was to be expected, for Johansen's consummate artistry always attracts large audiences.

Playing easily, urbanely, and with the impeccable technique which characterizes all his concerts, Johansen had the audience at his feet from the calm Marcello "Arioso" and cool Purcell "Suite in D," which opened the program, to the final, fiery presto of the Chopin "Sonata in B Minor."

Marcello's music is too seldom heard, if this short piece is a fair sample. The composer was an Italian nobleman of Bach's time, who took up music as an amateur, but turned critic and composer. His light, flowing "Arioso" was delightful.

Johansen lent a note of jollity to the homophone of the Purcell suite, which otherwise was grave and somewhat studied in its care for form.

Three sonatas completed the program: Beethoven's "Moonlight," Schubert's A-major, and the Chopin.

Johansen's thoughtful playing saved the too-familiar opening of the Beethoven sonata from triteness, and gave the second movement a poetic feeling. Then he loosed some of his power and fire to bring out the urgency of the closing "presto agitato."

The Schubert work is full of melody—almost enough for another operetta than "Blossom Time." The tunes are simple ones, but they have the beauty of a Schubert song, and some have the lilt of a Strauss waltz.

Less familiar than other Chopin works, the B-minor sonata overflows with musical ideas—it has lyricism, grandeur, power, and brilliance. Its final movement, in particular, demands the utmost artistry, to say nothing of skill.

In all of it, Johansen was the true virtuoso.
