

McMahon Urges Ike Be Called Home to Testify on Aid

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Sen. Brian McMahon (D-Conn.), a close supporter of the Truman administration, took Capitol Hill by surprise Tuesday with a formal request that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower be called home from Europe this month to testify on the \$7,900,000 foreign aid bill.

Sen. H. Alexander Smith (R-N.J.) promptly protested. Declaring that McMahon's proposal "would have political overtones, no matter how much they are denied," Smith told newsmen: "I don't think the general should be put on the spot to come back here right now. We should consult him confidentially first and ask if he is willing to come back before making any public move of this kind."

"I don't think it's proper to play politics, or appear to play politics, on this matter at the present time," Smith said. He is not committed to any candidate for the Republican presidential nomination.

McMahon denied politics had anything to do with his motion, which was made at a close-door session of the Senate Foreign Relations committee.

Ban on Yellow Oleo in New York Lifted
ALBANY, N. Y. — (U.P.) — Gov. Thomas E. Dewey signed into law Tuesday a bill permitting sale of yellow oleomargarine. The law lifts a 66-year-old state ban on the pre-colored product. It goes into effect July 1.

Assemblywoman Geneta M. Strong, sponsor of the bill, and Son Stanley J. Bauer of Buffalo, who had a companion measure in the upper house, witnessed the signing in Dewey's office.

Approval of the measure by the legislature last week climaxed a four-year battle by gray-haired Mrs. Strong, Plandome, N. Y. Republican. The legislation was strongly opposed by the state's \$4,000,000 dairy industry leaders.


