

TIP OF THE MORNING: With the revival of "Perfidia" on records, one can expect to hear "Franses" (another substitute of the non-ASCAP period of radio) getting a renewal, too.

"A CRES OF SKY," WHICH Arthur Kreutz and Zoe Lund Schiller wrote for the opening of the Fine Arts center of the University of Arkansas in 1950, will be produced in New York in May.

The Wisconsin-born composer and his wife, are rewriting the show for its presentation May 7-14 at Columbia university.

"It is something new in the direction that the American theater is now moving," Kreutz wrote us. "We'll have to invent a new word, because it's not opera, not a musical, not a musical play—so a new category is needed. It is a blending of drama, music, and choreography from American sources—an American panorama."

Kreutz is a native of La-Crosse who came to Madison to study engineering but who decided that music was his real calling and switched to the University of Wisconsin music school. He taught violin here and was frequently a soloist with Madison organizations.

But composition was his field, he found, and he won the Prix de Rome with one of his works. His music has been played by topflight orchestras across the country.

Miss Schiller (Mrs. Kreutz) is the author of "A Candle for a Star," which will be published April 1 by MacMillan. It is a story of the Pacific Northwest, with its central character a Wisconsin boy who ran away from home. The author, too, is a Wisconsin native—she was born in Milwaukee.

Woman Asks Trial for Not Paying Social Security Tax

STONINGTON, Conn. — (U.P.) — Vivien Kellems, arch enemy of "socialistic" federal tax laws, refused to pay the new social security tax on self-employed persons Sunday and said it would "clarify the whole matter" if the government would indict her and test the constitutionality of the law.

Miss Kellems, who owns a cable grip factory here, said in a letter to Secretary of the Treasurer John W. Snyder that she paid her income tax but "have not included a check for \$81.00 for self-employed government insurance" (as "I already carry adequate insurance and do not wish further coverage.")

"It will clarify the whole matter if you will please indict me and let us submit this law to the Supreme court in the traditional American manner, in order to test its constitutionality," she told Snyder in the letter.

Under the new social security law, small business owners are required to pay their own social security taxes by means of the self-employment tax. They are supposed to deduct social security taxes from their employees' wages too.

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Morris to Start Cleanup Inquiry

NEW YORK—(AP)—Newbold Morris, appointed by President Truman to clean up corruption in government, said Sunday he will send out questionnaires to top federal officials on Tuesday.

Morris did not disclose the contents of the questionnaires. But last month he said his first step in the probe would be a study of all outside income received by senior federal officials in the executive branch of the government.

"I figure it would take me about five or six hours to fill out the questionnaire," Morris said.

"It should not take any honest person much longer. The answers are to be as confidential as an income tax return."

Morris spoke at the 14th annual communion breakfast of the St. George Association of the New York postoffice, an Episcopal group.

Morris announced in Washington the appointment of Samuel Becker, Union theater in Madison May 17. Proceeds will assist the state wide drama program.

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East Germans 'Lock' UN Commission Out

BONN, Germany—(AP)—The United Nations (UN) commission to investigate conditions for holding all-German elections arrived in Bonn Saturday and said it still is locked out of Communist-ruled East Germany.

We are awaiting an official answer from the East German authorities to our request to investigate the possibility of holding free elections," said Kristjan Albertson of Iceland, the commission's chairman.

"So far we know only from the speeches of the East German government leaders that we are barred."

The West German government and Western Berlin have welcomed the investigation, Albertson said.

He declined to say whether the commission will make a further attempt to contact East German authorities or the Russians personally during its visits to Western Germany and Berlin in order to press for a formal answer.
