HOME TOWN PRIDE AND THE expectation of good music attracted a large audience to West high school auditorium Friday night, and both were rewarded.

Two members of Madison's most musical family—the Endres—chose from their assorted accomplishments to present a loudly-applauded program. They were Marie A. Endres and Emma Endres Kounts, conductor and pisnist respectively.

Miss Endres conducted the Madison String Sinfonia, one of the few such groups in the Midwest; her sister, Mrs. Kountz, was soloist.

The former is also concertmaster and assistant conductor of the Madison Civic Symphony orchestra, teacher at the Wisconsin School of Music and Milton college, choirmaster at St. James Catholic church, and frequently a violin soloist.

Mrs. Kountz is a composer, professor of piano at Mary Manse college in Toledo, and mother of two boys, as well as an accomplished pianist.

Under Miss Endres' baton, the Sinfonia moved through its program with vigor and considerable precision, but the best part of its playing was in its recognition of the value of tone color and its ability to bring it out. Most of the members are young, but they performed with a confidence, sometimes lacking in their elders.

Mrs. Kountz' performance of the rarely-heard Mozart "Concerto No. 14" and in Gibbs' "Peacock Ple," new to Madison, had the audience calling her back again and again. She was generous with encores, playing Brahms' "Capriccio in C-Sharp Minor," her own arrangement of a group of Haydn variations, and the always-beloved 'Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring."

Her greatest attributes were a clean melodic line, apparently inlimited power and rich tone.
