**Ballet Russe**

**TIP OF THE MORNING:** Ralph Edwards will return to his old Saturday night spot on NBC beginning May 3, and "Bob and Ray" will move to 7:30 p. m. Fridays beginning May 2.

NEXT season's plans for the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo are somewhat obscure, in view of some recent developments.

One thing is pretty sure, at the moment. Neither Alexandra Danilova nor Frederic Franklin will be in the company. Danilova has virtually retired from dancing to teach, but she may do some guest engagements with the company. Franklin and Mia Slavenska will co-star in a new company which will feature Antony Tudor's version of "A Streetcar Named Desire."

The Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo will send out a "concert company" under Sergei J. Denham which will do a single bill designed for smaller stages and auditoriums. It will have two-piano instead of orchestral accompaniment and will feature "Gaité Parisienne."

Only definite word on the senior company is that it will play Chicago from Dec. 26 to Jan. 4.

Mrs. Rudolph Langer, Madison, and Gertrude L. Hanson, Stevens Point, will be on programs at the 22nd Institute for Education by Radio-Television at Columbus, O., April 17-20. Mrs. Langer will be on a panel on "Organized Listener Groups" and Miss Hanson will take part in a discussion of "Broadcast Problems of Teacher Training Institutions."

"The U.S.S.R." is a documentary series originally broadcast by the American Broadcasting Co. The first program told of Russia's economy; the next will take up the evolution of a new Soviet man.

### Nevada Publisher Names McCarran in \$1 Million Suit

LAS VEGAS, Nev.—(AP)—The publisher of the Las Vegas Sun demanded \$1,000,000 damages Wednesday from U. S. Sen. Pat McCarran and 13 other defendants, charging they conspired to withhold advertising from his newspaper.

Publisher H. M. Greenspan filed suit against the Nevada senator, Lt. Gov. Clifford A. Jones and 12 Las Vegas hotels and casinos in Federal District Court.

He charged in the action that McCarran and the other defendants entered into a "conspiracy to injure and destroy the business of the newspaper."

The complaint said that on March 22, McCarran telephoned Marion B. Hicks of the Thunderbird hotel. As a result of the call, Greenspan charged, Hicks got in touch with gambling casino operators and conspired with them to withhold their advertising from the paper.

McCarran allegedly told Hicks that unless the casinos withdrew their advertising from the newspaper he would withdraw his support of legalized gambling.

Casino operators, however, said they withdrew all individual advertising from the Sun and the Las Vegas Review-Journal in order to run one large ad in each paper listing all of the town's night clubs.

Greenspan demanded \$1,000,000 punitive damages plus treble damages for \$266 a day allegedly in lost revenue from the advertising.

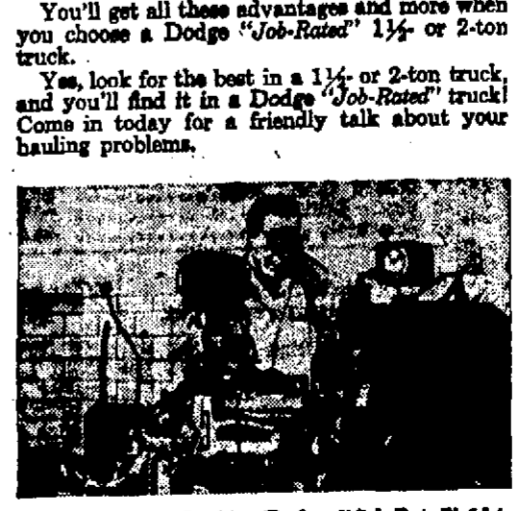
