DAVID THOMPSON'S "WIND on the River" won first prize of \$45 in Wisconsin Players' one-act play contest. Chairman Alex Karas of the playwriting contest committee has announced.

Second prize of \$25 went to Joe Kirkish for "Thunder in the Hills" and third award of \$15 to Donald Soule for "Some Other Time."

Virginia Abel and Arthur Dorlag received honorable mentions. The three prize plays will be produced May 20 and 21 in the Play Circle of the Memorial Union as the final studio play program of the season.

Judges were Basil Busacca, Jonathan Curvin, and Paul Wiley. The 22 entries set a new record for the contest, Karas said.

Relatives Defend 'Unruly' Fliers

Give Varied Reasons for Refusals to Fly

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI)—Relatives rallied Sunday to the defense of 12 Air Force officers who face possible disciplinary action for refusing to fly.

The Air Force revealed that a total of 225 officers have asked to be grounded.

"Never Got Over" The father of one of the 12 said his son had "never got over" flying in 35 combat missions in World War II and didn't want to take any more risks.

The mother of another said her son "has a horror of flying."

Mrs. F. A. Zimmerman, mother of Lt. Ralph C. Engel, stationed at Mather Air Force base, Calif., said she was not surprised that he had refused to fly after being recalled to the Air Force because he was "not a daredevil type—he just hated planes."

Sam Snoddy, Wellford, S. C., father of Lt. James D. Snoddy, another of the six "staydown strikers" at Mather, said the flier had been wounded during the war and had a wife and child to think of.

"Not Daredevil Type" Mrs. Zimmerman said her son was "not a daredevil type," but a student.

He had just finished work on his doctor of philosophy degree at the University of Michigan when he was called back to the service in November, after serving in World War II for four years. He had been an instructor and later flew in Italy.

Eddie Cantor to Make Tour for Blood Donors WASHINGTON (UPI)—The American Red Cross announced Sunday that comedian Eddie Cantor will give a series of two-hour stage shows Apr. 29 to May 6 for voluntary donors of blood to the Red Cross.

The one week tour designed to stimulate blood donations—will be financed at Cantor's own expense. He will be supported by a two-piano team. Sgt. Joseph C. Rodriguez, San Bernardino, Calif., Korean war veteran who won the Congressional Medal of Honor, will appear on each program.

Cantor said he became interested in the blood donor program during appearances at military hospitals where conversations with wounded veterans of the Korean war impressed him with the importance of blood donations.

The tour will begin in Boston.
