

Comparisons with last year's show are inevitable. In brief, they show the same rapid pace, resounding noise, and incredibly good timing of the sound effects, with a minimum of for-adults-only humor. Nevertheless, any of such comedy is too much in a show fike this, which is bound to attract children and which doesn't need it to collect laughs.

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
