**Names in the News**

**TIP O' THE MORNING:** After Vaughn Monroe's next picture, writers can stop calling him "the Cudahy cowboy." It will be a musical with a college setting, filmed in Denver.

**DONALD WAILIN** will be soloist in "Concerto for Clarinet and Band" at Central high school's spring concert at 8 p. m. Friday, April 25, in the school auditorium. **Walter J. Fandrich** will conduct the band and orchestra and **Darleen McCormick** will direct the choir.

**Percival Price**, professor of campanology and carillonist at the University of Michigan, will play the University of Wisconsin carillon from 12:45 to 1:25 p. m. today. (Campanology is the science of bells). Price is a graduate of the Mechlin Carillon school of Belgium; former carillonist at Riverside church, New York, and Ottawa Peace tower, in Canada, and author of a book on carillons. He is now on an air tour gathering material for a new volume, "Carillons in America."

**Julie and Juliette Gerke**, twin duo-pianists, will play tonight at the University club; Wednesday night for the Middleton Sportsmen's club at Club Chanticleer; Friday, April 25, for a Masonic banquet in Hotel Lorraine, and Friday, May 2, for the Woman's club of Madison.

**Pottery by Aaron Bohrod**, artist in residence at the University of Wisconsin, and **F. Carlton Ball**, ceramic artist of the Southern Illinois university (SIU) faculty, will have their first Illinois show April 20 to May 9. The cooperative show at SIU also will include paintings by Bohrod, and pottery by Ball.

**GOOD OLD DAYS:** Those who are old enough to remember the nickelodeon—those pioneer theaters of the movie industry—will recall, too, the song slides which were features of many of the shows.

**H. P. Thompson**, in his column "Brag and Braggage" in the Mid-County Times of Pardeeville, remembers well—and for good reason. He writes:

"There probably are but few people who, at some time in their life, have not gone through some embarrassing moment, when they wished they could crawl into a knot hole in a tree. We know that we have had many of them, but one which we remember most clearly occurred at the old 'Electric' theater way back in the illustrated song days, with two reels of moving pictures, and the show costing just a nickel."

We were engaged to sing for the illustrated song one evening, and it was thought desirable to sing in costume and make-up. Not being equipped with proper material, we had not much sooner gotten out on the stage in front of the drop curtain, when we could feel the false mustache coming loose. We pressed it back on time after time, and went through all sorts of facial gestures, but finally had to finish the song with the mustache cached in our pocket. The house was packed, and if our song didn't make much of an impression, we got a big hand when the mustache fell off on a high note.

We used to have to hold a buzzer in one hand while singing, to notify the operator when to change the slides for the several scenes in the song, and that night between the slides and the buzzer we got just exactly nowhere.

That was a calamity we've never forgotten.
