CHILDREN who saw "The Secret Garden" at the Capitol theater Tuesday appeared to like most of the play, in spite of a script which had far too much talk and far too little action, even for the average adult.

The situation was saved largely by two competent actresses -Dore Dickey, as 12-year-old Mary Lennox, and Dorette Wilder. as the maid Martha (and, the kids and I suspected, as her mother, Susan).

James Lyons, as Colin Craven, also did an adequate job, as did Jean Hageman as the overbearing Mrs. Medlock,

The story, as dramatized from the Burnett novel by Clare Tree Major, told of a spoited girl, Mary, who became a happy and lovable child while she was learning to cure her cousin, Colin, of his imaginary illness and his unreasoning temper.

Miss Dickey's portrayal of Mary was better than the play seemed to permit, with its incredibly swift change in the girl's outlook and demeanor when she met the unruly Colin.

The children in the audience often became restive during the periods of talk, but they loved the action and the simple comedy. They were audibly suspicious that Susan, was played by Miss Wilder. And that role was well played.

The boys' and girls' reaction showed again the need for such plays as this and those presented by the Madison Theater Guild-and showed, too, the Guild's rightness in its emphasis on action in its productions.
