


The Sunday Spotlight



Uncle Ray's Corner

Can You Put the Bird In?

Today we have before us a picture of a bird and a cage. If you use a 'small piece' of cardboard, and look closely, you should see the bird go into the cage. The cardboard should be about 3 inches long and 1 1/2 inches wide.



You can make this bird enter a cage if all goes well.

I have tried this trick (if it is a trick) several times, and it usually seems to work quickly enough, but once or twice the bird has seemed stubborn about moving. It is important to have the bridge of your nose on the card, so the object which is seen by your left eye will be entirely different from what you see with your right eye.

And the way we use them. We commonly use both our eyes in seeing an object. There really are two images which go to the brain, one seen by each eye, but they blend together in such a manner that both are seen as a single image.
