'DON JUAN TENORIO': One of the most popular of Spain's plays, "Don Juan Tenorio" by Zovillo, will be presented in modern dress by a University of Wisconsin cast.

Performances will be at 8 p. m. Friday, May 23, in the auditorium of Wisconsin State college, Milwaukee, and Monday and Tuesday, May 26 and 27 in the Play Circle of the Memorial Union.

Admission will be free, but tickets must be obtained in advance at the Wisconsin Union boxoffice or the office of the department of Spanish and Portuguese.

'PUCCINI MASS: A "Mass for Four Voices and Orchestra" by Giacomo Puccini, hitherto known in this country only for his operatic achievements, has just been acquired by Conductor Alfredo Antonini.

He will give the work its first American performance—and its first presentation since it was sung in Lucca, Italy, for the composer in 1880—at Grant park, Chicago, on Saturday, July 12. This is 72 years to the day after its only other performance. Antonini will again conduct a portion of the Mass at New York's Lewisohn Stadium on Thursday, July 17, with Jan Peerce as soloist.

The Mass is an early work of Puccini, composed in Lucca as his thesis for graduation from the Istituto Musicale Pacini. Although it was an outstanding success, its first performance was also its last. Puccini felt that the composition of religious music limited him, and soon turned to composing operas. The Mass was almost forgotten and might have remained unknown but for a Brooklyn priest, the Rev. Dante del Fiorentino, a friend of Antonini.

The priest went to Lucca to gather material for his recently published life of Puccini, "Immortal Bohemian." There, he renewed acquaintance with the family of Valdin, Puccini's musical secretary. The Valdinis gave him the manuscript, in the hope that it could be performed here, and he turned it over to Antonini. The Swedish Choral club of 150 voices will perform the American premiere.
