### JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Although a team of four contest is generally conceded to be the surest test of skill, very few bridge clubs organize team competitions. An outstanding exception, however, is the Paradise Bridge Studio, of New York City, where team games are held every Sunday night.

In the hand shown today an unusual defensive play was made by Milton Moss, playing with Sidney Mandell, in a team game at the Paradise Club.

Messrs. Moss and Mandell, both members of the 1952 Vanderbilt Cup Championship team, won the open pair game in last year's Decoration Day Tournament and were practicing for this year's tournament, scheduled for May 30 in New York.

West opened the seven of diamonds, dummy played low and Mr. Moss, holding the East cards, won with the king. The key play had to be made at this point.

Just for the fun of it, look at the hands and decide on the best defensive play. Then read on about what Mr. Moss did.

Mr. Moss decided that his partner had not led a singleton diamond. He chose instead to try for two heart tricks. He therefore returned his low spade.

Declarer won with the king of spades, and was then unable to make the contract. He could not safely take a discard on dummy's ace of diamonds without drawing

### Russ Apparently End Berlin Blockade

BERLIN — (AP)—Western officials said Sunday the Russian on-and-off blockade of military patrols between Berlin and Helmsstedt apparently has ended.

The Allied vehicles, which daily patrol the 110-mile international road, were allowed to pass Saturday and Sunday after a series of Soviet heckling maneuvers which started May 8.

The Russians barred them intermittently, but gave no reason except for a report published in the Soviet licensed news agency ADN, which said the Russians had protested against "armed and specially equipped" patrol cars. Allied officials dismissed this charge as nonsense.

### Court Decision on Steel Awaited

#### No Flat Assertion on Seizure Expected

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Whatever else it says, the Supreme Court appears likely in its steel case decision to avoid a flat assertion that the President of the United States has no constitutional seizure powers.

The nine high court justices have been studying the historic case for six days, following arguments by the Justice Department that President Truman had ample constitutional power to seize the industry; and by the industry that Truman's action was an illegal "extension of executive power without parallel in American history."

The decision could come today; it might not come for another week or even longer.

#### Arguments Told

Specifically, the Justice Department, which is Truman's legal arm, has asked the court to overturn a ruling by U. S. District Judge David A. Pine that the steel seizure on Apr. 8 was "illegal and without authority of law."

The industry has asked the court to uphold Pine's decision. It contends Pine "correctly resolved" the issues. Truman seized the mills a few minutes before a scheduled strike by 650,000 CIO steelworkers.

Legal authorities on both sides of the question were in substantial agreement Sunday that:

ONE. There is an excellent chance the high court will not decide the underlying constitutional issue over the President's claimed inherent or residual power.

TWO. Even if the court ruled that Mr. Truman acted unconstitutionally in seizing the steel mills, it probably would weaken or nullify the decision so far as most future presidential actions are concerned by applying it with narrow

### These 'Meteors' Go Straight Up U.W. Must Serve Whole State, Extension Chief Tells Audience

The university faculty is more than just a community of scholars in Madison, but members must place their skills at the disposal of all the state, Dr. Lorenz H. Adolfsen, director of the University of Wisconsin extension division, told social work students and alumni at their Kennedy Manor banquet Saturday night.

"You are dealing with the vast insecurity of our time brought down to a personal level. The university wants to help you do your job," he said, outlining the work of his department with particular emphasis on its use to social workers, both for themselves and the people they serve.

He stressed the service role of the university and especially the extension division, which he sees as an important phase of the lifelong education program so necessary in these times. The needs of adult education are increasing, and the people of Wisconsin are turning to the university for help, he said.

The recent establishment of a school of social work at the university climaxed an effort begun by Prof. John Gillin in 1920. Dr. Arthur P. Miles, director of the school, told the group.

#### Professor to Study Roosevelt's Influence

PHILADELPHIA—(AP)—A Stanford university history professor, Edgar Eugene Robinson, was named Sunday to direct a study of what influence—good or bad—the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt had on history.

The project which will be the basis for a book, was directed in the will of the late J. Brooks Parker, Philadelphia sportsman and businessman, who bequeathed \$25,000 for it.

He said the appraisal must be "without fear, favor, or prejudice of any kind whatsoever." He also noted in the will his own belief that the influence of FDR "was very great."

Executors of Parker's estate have been seeking a director for the research project since shortly after Parker died last Nov. 30. They announced Sunday the selection of Professor Robinson, who is director of the Institute of American History at Stanford.

"More than 100 alumni, students, and faculty attended the banquet sponsored by the Social Work club, student group, and the alumni association of the school."

Establishment of the school ends a phase of development, Miles indicated. The next phase is one of solidifying, with no expansion in sight. Fewer courses in more concentrated form will be in order, with higher standards and more individual instruction. New phases of work such as in the correction field are being planned.
