# U. S. to Process POWs' Claims

**War II Prisoners to Get Payments**

WASHINGTON — The War Claims Commission hopes to start paying claims in August to American World War II prisoners of war who were subjected to forced labor by their enemy captors.

A spokesman said the commission has almost completed its form on which such claims must be filed and hopes to have it printed soon. If all goes well, he said, the commission feels it will be able to pay the first claim about Aug. 1.

The commission was authorized earlier this year to pay \$1.50 a day to Americans who were held as prisoners of war and were subjected to forced labor or inhumane treatment.

The Commission expects about 132,000 such claims from Americans held as prisoners or their survivors and about 100,000 from Filipinos who served with U. S. forces.

The payment will be the second made to U. S. prisoners of war. Earlier, the commission started paying \$1 a day to POWs not issued proper food and rations while they were held by the enemy. The job is still under way.

Money for the payments comes from the sale of enemy property held by the Office of Alien Property.

# JACOBY ON BRIDGE

When the average player holds a suit headed by A-J-10 his natural instinct is to take at least one finesse.

This is not always the soundest procedure, as today's hand shows. West opened the queen of spades, the king of spades was played from dummy, and East won with the ace.

Declarer ruffed the spade return and entered dummy with a club to try a heart finesse. This was a poor idea.

West won with the queen of hearts and shifted to the nine of diamonds.

Now declarer was in hot water without a life boat. He had to lose a diamond and another trump no matter how he continued.

A trump finesse might have been a sound idea if dummy had held a second trump.

Then, if the first trump finesse lost, South could try a second finesse. As it was, a single finesse gave South practically no advantage and exposed him to a prompt diamond return by West.


The correct play in this situation, which occurs in play fairly often, is to lay down the ace of trumps immediately and to continue with the jack of trumps.

If South had done so after ruffing the second spade with a low trump, his ace of trumps would have caught West's queen, and the rest of the hand would have been very easy.

If South is not lucky enough to drop a singleton honor with his ace of trumps, he has several other chances to make his contract.

He continues with the jack of trumps, and may find that East is obliged to win the trick.

Since a diamond return can not



be made by East, South will then be quite safe.

Even if West wins the second trump trick, declarer is still safe unless West shifts to diamonds.

In that case, of course, South must guess whether to try the diamond finesse or to try for a discard on one of dummy's club.
