THE 22-VOICE UNIVERSITY of Wisconsin A Cappella choir stole the show from the far larger University chorus Sunday night at Music hall when the two organizations opened campus and city observance of National Music Week.

Both were directed by Prof. Paul G. Jones. He drew from the a cappella singers as fine a performance by a vocal group as this reviewer has heard on the campus in a long time, and the best this season.

They made news, too, by singing for the first time a pair of works of Thomas B. Jones, 1950 Wisconsin alumnus. Based on poems by e. e. cummings, they were less radical in form than the verse but still suggested the poet's departures in style and caught the spirit of his striking metaphors and compactness. Two encores answered the audience's demands for more music.

The larger chorus was best in Mozart's "Mass in F Major," a melodious and often sonorous work. The "Kyrie Eleison" and "Osanna" received especially good attention.

A quartet showed good command of good voices in solos and ensemble work, with Keith Macy dominating the latter with his lyrical tenor.

The concert opened with Bach's "Jesus, Dearest Master." Three of its chorales (especially the opening one) were beautifully done, but others suffered from uncertainty in pitch and attack.

COMING-OF-AGE: From all over southern Wisconsin, hundreds of boys and girls will come to Madison on Saturday to help Prof. B. B. Gordon, their radio music teacher, celebrate the "coming of age" of his Wisconsin School of the Air program, "Journeys in Music Land."

They will take part in a songfest at 1 p.m. in the University of Wisconsin stock pavilion, the climax of the 21st year of Gordon's broadcasts from the campus.

Gordon will conduct the massed choir in a concert which will be broadcast by WHA and the state FM network.

The festival is being arranged by Arlene McKeellar, of the Wisconsin School of the Air. Admission will be by invitation.

Since 1931, Gordon has been broadcasting a music appreciation course to adult listeners. Each Wednesday at 1:30 during the school year he brings radio music lessons to grade school pupils throughout Wisconsin. Each spring these songsters have a chance to see their radio teacher in person and sing for him the songs he teaches them during the year. This year approximately 90,000 children enrolled in the course.

Those taking part in the music festival will also be able to meet James A. Schwalbach, university extension specialist in art and design and creator of the "Let's Draw" radio art course, broadcast each Tuesday at 1:30 p.m. over the state stations. Schwalbach will attend the festival, talk on the radio art course, and exhibit children's art work.
