**DELIGHTFUL" is a mild and overworked word, but taken in all the meanings in this department's desk dictionary, it fits the sonata recital which Ernst and Marie Friedlander gave Tuesday night in Music hall.

The definitions: "affording delight (great pleasure, sensual or mental); extremely gratifying; charming."

All these things it was, and the audience found the music and playing so worth while it called the cellist and pianist back for a half-dozen bows.

Artistic integrity as well as virtuosity in performance and an almost psychic accord between the musicians marked the program.

These qualities appeared at their highest in Beethoven's "Sonata in A Major," third of five such works and one of the most popular pieces of its kind. Opening holdly with the cello sounding the first theme alone, it carried its sense of broadness through all the movements, even the somewhat jocular scherzo and the poignant adagic antabile, the only slow portion.

In Brahms' "Sonata in E Minor," there were song and thunder in the first movement, lyricism and grace in the second, and dashing vigor in the third.

The Friedlanders ended their program with a sonata by Locaelli, a relatively obscure composer of the Corelli-Vivaldi era. Light and showy, using the full range facilities of the instrument, it was a piece to give the cellist a chance to show his agility and dexterity, with the pianist serving as little more than accompanist.

MUSIC WEEK: Three campus musicians tonight will give the third concert in the National Music Week series presented by the University of Wisconsin school of music. They are Leo Steffens, piano; Shirley Reynolds, violing

and Verne Reynolds, French horn. The free concert will be at 8 in Music hall. The music will be Quincy Porter's "Sonata for Horn and Piano," written in 1948; Agron Copland's "Sonata for Violin and Piano," composed

in 1943, and Brahms' "Trio in E Flat Major, Opus 40." Steffens, a professor in the music school, is familiar to Madison udiences as a soloist and ensemble musician. He has been soloist re-

cently with civic orchestras at Elgin, Ill., and Waukesha. Reynolds, also a member of the music school staff, holds a master's degree from Wisconsin and has played with the Cincinnati Sym-

phony orchestra. Mrs. Reynolds, a graduate student, has a master's degree from the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music and last season was concertmaster of the Madison Civic Symphony orchestra.
