Court Decision on Steel Awaited No Flat Assertion on Seizure Expected

WASHINGTON - (P) - Whatever else it says, the Supreme ever else it says, the Supreme Court appears likely in its steel case decision to avoid a flat as-sertion that the President of the United States has no constitutional seizure powers.

The nine high court justices have been studying the historic case for six days, following arguments by the Justice Department that President Truman had ample onstitutional power to seize the constitutional power to seize the industry; and by the industry that Truman's action was an illegal "extension of executive power without parallel in American history.'

The decision could come today; it might not come for another week or even longer.

Arguments Told

Specifically, the Justice Department, which is Truman's legal arm, has asked the court to overturn nas asked the court to overturn a ruling by U. S. District Judge David A. Pine that the steel seizure on Apr. 8 was "illegal and without authority of law."

The industry has asked the court to uphold Pine's decision. It con-tends Pine "correctly resolved" the issues. Truman seized the mills a few minutes before a scheduled strike by 650,000 CIO teelworkers.






