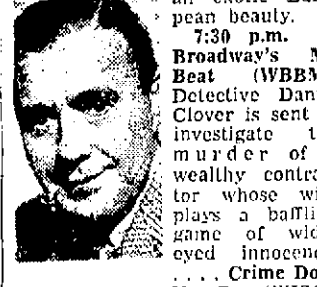

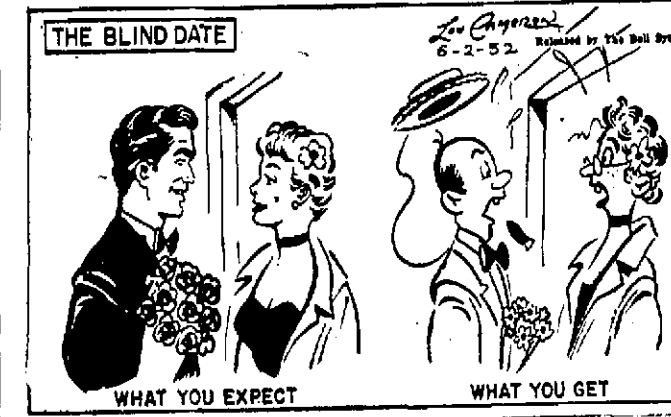

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

West waited patiently for the opponents to get high enough before he doubled. When South finally got to four spades, West doubled with a sense of outrage.

The opponents had evidently gone out of their minds, and West felt half sorry for South as he doubled.

West chose his best opening lead, the king of spades. Thereupon South, in the elegant language of bridge players, proceeded to wrap the contract around West's neck.

Declarer won the first trick in dummy with the ace of spades, cashed the ace of clubs, and ruffed a club. He then cashed the ace and king of diamonds and ruffed a diamond in his hand.

When East showed up with only two diamonds, South realized that it would be his hand later on. Before he did so, however, he cashed the ace and king of hearts and ruffed a heart in dummy. Then he ruffed a diamond in his own hand thus collecting a total of 10 tricks.

By this time West was left with the queen-jack-nine of trumps and a case of near apoplexy.

As South generously conceded the jack three tricks East duly observed "Nice double, partner."

West's reply is best left to the imagination.

Canadian Estimates Seaway Timetable

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — W. D. Matthews, Canadian minister to the United States, said Sunday the St. Lawrence Seaway will take from four and a half to five years to complete after it is begun, possibly in the spring of 1953.

In a radio interview with the Gamma News Service, Matthews said "it is doubtful if all of the necessary authorizations could possibly be obtained in time to permit construction to begin before the spring of 1953."

Matthews said this means that allowing for construction time, "we cannot look forward to the shipment of goods through the new canal before 1958."

Canada has decided to begin the seaway by itself because Congress has declined to approve this country's participation in the project.

However, power development on the St. Lawrence will be a joint project with Canada and a body sharing the estimated \$200,000,000 cost. The cost of the seaway works between Montreal and Lake Erie will be undertaken by Canada is estimated at \$250,000,000.
