**TIP O' THE MORNING:** Time for "Big City Serenade" salute to Madison has been changed to 3:30 p. m. Saturday on WIBA. Reason: the station will carry Jack Newman's report of the Wisconsin-California crew race at 1:30.

COLUMBIA Pictures has signed Charles Laughton to play King Herod in "Salome, the Dance of the Seven Veils," which will star Rita Hayworth. Dances will be staged by Valerie Bettis. Meanwhile, Laughton is in London conferring with J. B. Priestley on a proposed production of "The Dragon's Mouth" in this country.

Dick Haymes will have the romantic lead in "All Ashore," next Mickey Rooney film. Everett Mitchell, NBC farm commentator, has established two annual \$500 awards to be presented to the young man and young woman of the United Lutheran Church in America "showing evidence of outstanding Christian leadership in everyday life."

Ralph Bellamy is looking for a play in which he can appear on Broadway next season. His last show on the Main Stem was "Detective Story," which ran more than a year.

Torin Thatcher, star of British films and Broadway plays, has flown from London to Hollywood to play Sir Henry Morgan in "Blackboard Jungle" for RKO Radio Pictures.

Mona Freeman, who has just finished work on "Jumping Jacks," the Martin and Lewis comedy, moves over to RKO Radio for a featured role in "Murder," which will star Robert Mitchum and Jean Simmons. Filming begins next Monday.

Broderick Crawford and Claire Trevor will co-star in "Stop, You're Killing Me" at Warners.

Jean Herscholt has made a second major gift to the Library of Congress—a complete collection of autographed Sinclair Lewis first editions. He recently delivered part of his extensive Hans Christian Andersen collection to the library.

Rosalind Russell may go to London in the fall to star in "Bell, Book, and Candle." It's possible Gregory Peck will be co-star. Miss Russell played in the John Van Druten show in Chicago for 18 weeks, but had to leave to start work on "Never Wave at a Wave" in Hollywood.

**DISC OF THE DAY:** There are signs of a new singing star in Barbara Ruick's recording of "I'd Wanna Walk Right Out of This World" and "How About You" for MGM. In these days of hyperemotional singing, her ability to project personality with restrained delivery is worth a lot.

**BARBERSHOPPERS:** The Cardinals, Madison barber-shop quartet, will compete today for the national championship of the Society for the Promotion and Encouragement of Barbershop Quartet Singing in America, Inc. The contest will begin today with selection of 15 finalists, who will compete for the title Saturday.

For four successive years, the Cardinals have been among the top 10 quartets in the society. They won a regional contest at Waukesha in May, and took the Land o' Lakes district title seven years ago. Under society rules, a championship quartet cannot compete a second time.

REVIEWER: Helen Matheson. STORY: During a recess in their divorce hearing, young Mr. and Mrs. Keefe sit down to talk with the judge—and find themselves pouring out the whole funny, pathetic story of why their marriage has... led.

**HIGH POINTS:** Comedy that raises not from tricks of plot or dialog but from the way people act when they don't know outsiders are looking... tragedy, doubly moving because it springs from the same source... a maturely-conceived, well thought-out plot that achieves almost the impact of a case study... dialog brilliantly written in the incoherent, ungrammatical, vigorous language people really speak, and topically effective when moments of deepest feeling when husband and wife talk to each other in clumsy, heart-felt cliches.

**VERDICT:** Don't expect "The Marrying Kind" to be a hilarious sequel to "Born Yesterday." It isn't.

Instead—a n d unexpectedly—it is an honest look at contemporary life. If it came from Europe complete with murky photography and English sub-titles it would undoubtedly be hailed as an Artistic Triumph. But made in Hollywood, lacking showy "dramatic" scenes for its two fine stars, and falling to fit into the standard entertainment classification, it will probably miss the acclaim it deserves.
