VERSATILITY KEYNOTED the "Music With the Girls" revue which an invited audience of about 2,200 persons attended Thursday night at the Capitol theater.

Recording of a broadcast to be heard Saturday on CBS-WKOW preceded the regular show, and for many of the spectators this was a novelty in itself.

Beautifully costumed and efficiently staged, the revue could compete in talent and production with anything of its kind on the road, despite the fact that few of the girls were professionals before joining the troupe.

Villas and an unnamed property man were the only males on the stage, and the latter furnished some of the best laughs, without saying a word.

A memory sequence topped the big numbers, with cancan girls, Police Gazette cover queens, and "Merry Widow" waltzers lavishly costumed.

Ike Prepares Talks on Texas Dispute, Reclamation Issue

DENVER (AP)—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower prepared Thursday for a flying weekend trip to Texas and Nevada, where he is expected to speak out on the contested Texas GOP delegates and on Western reclamation.

The general kept the day free of appointments. His office said he worked on mail and on ideas he will develop in five free-wheeling meetings, speeches, and news conferences during the trip.

The Republican presidential aspirant said Wednesday, in talking to the Oregon delegation, that he will speak out on the Texas delegate situation. Contesting groups support him and Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio for the nomination.

National GOP headquarters has announced that all contests—in Texas and elsewhere—will be carried before the party's national committee at Chicago.

After stopping in Texas Saturday, the general will go to Hoover Dam in Nevada Sunday. That trip gives him an opportunity to express his view on reclamation.

Civil Defense Booklets Ready for Distribution

Madison or Dane county businesses willing to sponsor distribution of any of five civil defense booklets may see them at the city-county civil defense office, Director L. G. Trowbridge said Thursday.

Trowbridge said distribution of the booklets, official publications of the federal Civil Defense Administration, would be helping Americans to protect themselves as well as an act of good citizenship.

The booklets can be bought from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington 25, D. C., for 5 cents and 10 cents a copy. Federal government permission automatically is granted with their sale for any re-publication, free distribution, legitimate promotional purposes, or for sale.

Permission also was granted by the Madison-Dane county Joint Special Civil Defense committee for businesses to undertake the sponsorship as a donation to civil defense in the city and county.

Titles of the booklets are: "Fighting for Householders," "What You Should Know About Biological Warfare," "Survival Under Atomic Attack," "This is Civil Defense," and "Emergency Action to Save Lives."
