Allies' Air Power Spread 'Too Thin,' Gen. Weyland Says

WASHINGTON (UP)—Lt. Gen. Otto P. Weyland, Far East Air Forces commander, asserted Tuesday that America is not making adequate efforts to meet the Russian challenge in the air. He said in a message from Tokyo on the second anniversary of the Korean War that the free world's air power is spread "dangerously thin."

Martin's concerto will be played on a Sunday broadcast in November by Josef Szigell, who played it with the Philadelphia orchestra in 1940.

DISC OF THE DAY: George Gershwin wrote "Cuban Overture" in 1922, but it had to wait 20 years to be recorded. Now it's on a Columbia LP, played by Andre Kostelanetz. A highly descriptive number, it's done beautifully by the Kostelanetz orchestra. The record also includes highlights from "Porgy and Bess," "Mine," and "Love Walked In."

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
