Sheldon Swope, who died in 1929, willed that the accumulation of all his many properties be held in trust for 10 years to provide funds for opening a gallery and buying a collection. The gallery was to be in the "Swope Block," a store and office building at one of Terre Haute's busiest downtown corners, Since then, as the will provided, the income has been used for maintenance and further purchases.

Many of the paintings and other art works have been donated by other persons and funds.

The second floor of the building now houses the exhibition rooms and offices; the third holds heating and air-conditioning units and art objects for which there is no room in the galleries. When funds are available (probably within a couple of years), this floor, too, will be turned into exhibition areas.






