JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By Oswald Jacoby. 'Maybe you can find a name for the East player in today's hand,' writes a San Francisco correspondent. 'The South player was Lacey Lou or Generous George—we are not sure which. 'We haven't found a name for East, although several have been suggested. 'West opened the king of spades and South ruffed, Declarer cashed the ace of hearts and led a low trump towards the dummy. 'West hopped up with the ace of diamonds to lead another spade, and South ruffed again. 'Declarer led the ten of diamonds to dummy's jack, after which there was only one trump left in the North hand, East hand, and South hand. Declarer now led dummy's remaining heart and East gleefully pounced upon this trick with his last trump. East then led a third spade with an air of conscious virtue. 'Declarer had no further trouble with his contract. He ruffed the spade with his last trump, ruffed a low heart with dummy's last trump, and returned to his hand with the king of clubs. All his hearts were now good and South rolled the contract home. 'Can you make a few blistering remarks about East and his play? I am afraid that I am not very good at blistering remarks. But I can say that East's ruff of the low heart was the kind of play that gives palookas a bad name. If East simply discarded instead of ruffing with his last trump, South cannot make his contract. South can take the king of hearts and ruff one heart in dummy, but his suit is still not established. South will wind up making nine tricks instead of eleven.

Pursuant to Section 101.01-101.26, Wisconsin Statutes, the Industrial Commission of Wisconsin on May 21, 1952, adopted order 224 "Working Express and Package Cars" to the Orders Relative to Sanitary Facilities in Railroad Terminals and Caboose. This new order reads as follows: Order. Working Express and Package Cars. (1) Every car shall be kept in a reasonably clean condition, including the floor. (2) All car doors shall be kept in repair, they shall be kept in good repair and adequately supplied with seal. (3) All car doors shall be kept in repair, they shall be kept in good repair and adequately supplied with seal. (4) Drinking water facilities shall be provided and shall be kept clean and sanitary. (8) Stationary safes, where used, shall be anchored. (9) Sanitary toilet facilities shall be provided and maintained or made accessible in adjacent cars. Kohler Approves 6 Road Contracts

(By Tribune Press) Highway contracts totaling \$749,322 for work in six counties were approved Friday by Gov. Walter Kohler, the executive office said. The largest job was a \$379,857 project for partial reconstruction of 6 miles of State Highways 13-73 west of Wisconsin Rapids. It covers construction of two bridges, grading, drainage, and placing of a ballast course. Another large project will cost \$310,762 for grading and draining 7.85 miles of State Highway 17 just north of Rhinelander and near the Vilas county line. Other contracts were approved in the following counties: Brown—Grading, drainage, and bituminous surfacing 2.06 miles of County Trunk "PP" \$20,295. Burnett—Grading, drainage, and gravel surfacing .94 mile of State Highway 35 east of Danbury, \$19,184. Kewaunee—Erection of bridge over Little Scarboro creek on State Highway 163 south of Luxemburg, \$19,949. Door—Bituminous surfacing 2.5 miles of a detour during construction of State Highways 42-57, \$6,275.

City Firefighters Plan Annual Picnic

Angered Newark Residents Demand Closing of Airfield

NEWARK, N. J.—(AP)—Thousands of residents of this town, some angry and some "wild with fear" over the coming reopening of Newark Airport, demanded Friday that the big field they consider jinxed be kept closed forever and officials prepared to appeal to Gov. Alfred E. Driscoll. Citizens of Newark and Elizabeth, N. J., minded of three air crash disasters that took 119 lives last winter and forced closing of the airport, refused to be mollified by the new safety regulations governing limited operation of the field starting at midnight Sunday. A committee of mayors from Newark, Elizabeth, Linden, Hillside, Union and other nearby towns drafted a personal appeal to the governor, demanding that he order the Port of New York Authority to cancel the scheduled reopening. The mayors charged that lives of persons in the area will be menaced by plane traffic. A petition bearing some 40,000 names, called for abandoning the airfield permanently. Nelson F. Stambler, state deputy attorney general and a resident of Elizabeth, said the city of 110,000 was "seething with resentment" and felt that state and federal authorities had betrayed the signers of the petition. Postman John Papish, who lives in North Elizabeth near the airport, said he was "sick" at the thought of the reopening. "The last couple of months, I've had the best sleep in 10 years," he said. "Now the thought of those planes buzzing overhead again makes me sick."

Search for Crew of B-29 Down in Pacific Abandoned

HONOLULU (AP)—The Navy and Air Force Friday abandoned the search for 10 crewmen aboard a Japan-based B-29 Superfortress which was ditched in the sea 125 miles west of Kwajalein Thursday. Only the pilot, who suffered a broken leg, was rescued from the shark-infested waters. He was picked up by a Navy patrol craft shortly before dark and returned to Kwajalein Friday. Navy patrol craft and an Air Force crash boat searched throughout the night and two B-29s made a final circling air search Friday morning. The Super-Fort made a forced landing in the Pacific in full view of two companion B-29s. The 3 Super-Forts had taken off from Kwajalein for Guam when two engines went dead on the ill-fated bomber. The pilot said the plane broke up and sank so quickly that only one other man got out of the plane. He said this man sank before he could reach him. One of the companion B-29s remained and circled the area. Four hours after the plane was ditched a Navy patrol craft picked up the pilot, who had made it to a life raft. The search craft could find only debris on the water. Names of the missing crew members and the rescued pilot were withheld.
